Beautiful Wedding Is Of Maritime Interest

Norma Gaudette and Edward Hamilton were married in a pretty double ring ceremony this summer in the St. Simon, and St. Jude Roman Catholic Church at Tignish, Rev. M.J. Rooney, pastor, officiated.

The altar and sanctuary were beautifully decorated with a variety of flowers and the pews reserved for invited guests were marked with white bows. At the altar rail where the groom stood in waiting the bride was given away by her father.

The nuptial event marked for the first time in the history of this ninety-eight year old edifice, the colorful setting of a wedding ceremony whereby the groom, best man and ushers were attired in the Walking Out Order dress uniforms of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.

The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Edward C. Gaudette, Tignish, Prince Edward Island, while the groom's parents are Mr. and Mrs. Edward Hamilton, senior of Belle Island, Newfoundland.

The bride wore a floor length gown of rosepoint Chantilly lace and gossamer tulle. The elongated torso featured a sabrina neckline of scalloped lace traced with sequins. Long tapering sleeves buttoned snugly at the wrists. A back cascade of lace and tulle flourishes, enhanced the voluminous skirt which was worn over bridal satin and full hoop.

The headpiece comprised a shoulder length veil of silk illusion fell from a crescent shaped shell hat of gathered tulle, incrustated with sequins and pseudo pearls. The white prayer-book she carried had flowing streamers of white satin ribbons with bows.

Ann Gaudette, sister of the bride was maid of honor. The two bridesmaids were Bernice and Verna Gaudette also the bride's sister. Each wore identical ballarina length gowns of white silk organza with a white cummerbund worn by the maid of honor and red ones for the two bridesmaids ending in a huge back row. The gowns had bouffant skirts

gathered over miramist taffeta and full hoops.

The head pieces consisted of white pleated tulle brimmed hats trimmed with red miniature flowers.

Best man was James Maloney and the ushers were John Cook and Charles Walper.

With Albert Noonan soloist and Mrs. Kenneth Fraser at the organ, Lohengrin's wedding march and other appropriate selections were rendered.

Reception and dinner were held at the Summerlea Banquet Hall, Summerside, with J. Elmer Blanchard as master of ceremonies.

The bride's mother was attired in a pale blue gown with matching duster and white accessories. She wore a corsage of white roses. The groom's parents were unable to be present however, his two brothers Neil and Bryant Hamilton were in attendance.
