**SINGULAR CASE OF ABDUCTION.**—The Presse says—"A phenomenon, as strange as it is frightful, is now the subject of conversation at St. Pierre, in the Oise.—Two children have been carried off by a whirlwind in presence of their parents. The whole country, has been visited by two leaves, has been visited without any news being heard of them. It is feared they were carried into the river Oise."

A clergyman at Rochester, on leaving a brother's shop put on in mistake the coat of another person. When the gentleman to whom the coat belonged came to put it on, he was greatly surprised to find it gone. A pursuit was made, and the reverend gentleman was found comfortably taking his breakfast, without having discovered the mistake, and of course was greatly surprised when told that the coat he had on contained a pocket book with five thousand dollars in it.

**CUBA.**—A Rumor.—The Baltimore Sun says that for a day or two past, a rumor has been prevalent in that city that advice of an important character had been received at Washington, to the effect, that at the instance of Espartaco, the late Spanish regent, the British government had determined upon taking possession of Cuba, and had actually taken measures to that end.—Sun.

**TURKEY.**—Our private letters from Constantinople of the 8th inst. state that the greatest activity prevailed in the military departments of the Porte, and that on the 6th an Imperial fiat, incorporating the militia with the regular army during a period of five years, had been proclaimed with great pomp in presence of the Sultan, the ministers, and the troops of the garrison.

**SERVIA.**—The publication of the *herald of the Sultan*, confirming the election of Prince Alexander as Sovereign of Servia, took place in due form at Belgrade, on the 4th ult., in the presence of the Turkish Governor, the Baron de Liechten, the Consuls of France and England.

**SERIA.**—Letters from Beyrout mention an unpleasant occurrence at Jerusalem. Dr. McGowan, physician to the Protestant mission, was sitting on horseback before a green grocer's shop, ordering some melons, when a party of soldiers began to jeer him and to tickle his horse. After intemperately desiring them to desist, he went his way behind to keep them off. He was instantly dragged from his horse and severely beaten.

On Colonel Rose's representation, the Seraskier, Ahmed Pasha, sent Omar Bey, Colonel of Artillery, to Jerusalem, to inquire into the case. The British authorities placed the Queen's ship *Ceyser* at Omar Bey's disposal, and he left Beyrout on the 27th July for Jaffa. The house of the French Consul at Jerusalem had also been violently attacked, because he hoisted the flag of his country.

**AUSTRALIA.**—Advices from Sydney to the 7th May, describe the recurrence of the most deplorable commercial difficulties. The failure of the Bank of Australia and the Bank of Sydney had caused a run upon the other banks. The Savings' Bank had even fallen under suspicion, but the rumors concerning it were attributed to private malice. The markets are reported as "dull."
