## TAMPERING WITH CIMN SPEAKER

Students who frequent the Pit may have noticed that CIMN is not broadcasting through the speaker located there. The Pit is the only place on campus outside of the residences that U.P.E.I. student radio can be heard, but since September, the radio has not been on.

The reason for this is that, contrary to University policy, maintenance and Marriott staff in the Pit have been turning off the speaker. This has happened repeatedly, despite formal reminders to the persons involved of the policy that the speaker is CIMN's exclusive property, and is only to be turned on and off by CIMN management.

As well, CIMN Station Manager Todd King has been the target of abusive telephone calls placed by one student upset that the speaker was on. Apparently, the caller found it difficult to study in the Pit, and blamed this on the CIMN broadcast.

CIMN does not have the resources to police the Pit speaker, so Todd King is considering moving it to Blanchard Hall's Lounge where residents have expressed a strong interest in having it installed. This, however, would mean that all non-residents would be deprived of easy, public access to their Student Radio Station, but that is what will happen unless this tampering with CIMN equipment can be stopped. ■
