

# Wilbert Hopkins Killed In Race Horse Collision

CAMPBELLVILLE, Ont. (CP)—Wilbert Hopkins, a 28-year-old driver from Milton, Ontario, was killed Saturday night at Mohawk Raceway when he was thrown from his sulky as a spectacular race horse, still in the Grape Festival stake.

Hopkins, who was driving Armo Eclipse in the 12-horse field, was catapulted high in the air and landed on his head when Armo Eclipse fell over Lynden Alex which had gone into a break at the horse's end of a fracture skull and neck.

The veteran horseman, who operated a public stable and handled the trotter Canadian Intruder for Ross and McKinnon of Owen Sound, was the last driver to be involved in a fatal crash in the race.

# Booming Economy Shows Signs of Critical Stage

The long-striding expansion of the Canadian economy is showing signs of entering a critical stage.

It's not that the 3 1/2 years of growth is necessarily overdone. Indeed, almost all the major economic indicators have performed better than the most optimistic forecaster would have dared predict at the end of the year.

But many economists have been suggesting recently that the economy may be moving into an increasingly precarious balance between a essential continued growth and dangerous over-expansion.

The latest survey comes from the Bank of Nova Scotia and it puts the situation this way:

"The challenge will be to nurture the expansion enough but not let it get out of hand."

# N.Y. Stocks Drop Slightly During Week

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market went through a slight correction last week, showing a lower close in heavy trading.

Volume of 27,650,230 shares compared with 20,964,600 in the previous week, which was cut four days by the Labor Day holiday. It was the heaviest weekly volume since the week ended April 22 when 29,063,061 shares were traded.

In spite of the easy performance for the week as a whole, the market showed one big flash of power on Thursday when it roared to new highs of 883.87 in the Dow Jones industrial average and 324.9 in the Associated Press average of 60 stocks.

Another shooting scare in the Bay of Fundy threatened a brisk sell-off on Friday.

The Dow industrials declined 2.0 to 881.2. The average fell 7.0 to 323.1.

# HOPE FOR STRENGTH

"What is to be hoped, of course, is that the rate of business capital expansion remains strong enough to provide the adjustments in other sectors, yet not so strong as to push total demand upward to a rate that could not be sustained."

However, Finance Minister Walter Gordon told the Canadian Club in Hamilton Friday that there are no signs of an economic boom that is predicted continuing expansion into 1965.

He predicted a considerable reduction in the 1964-1965 federal deficit from his March forecast of \$43,000,000.

He said Canada's economic growth has been well balanced because there are no apparent excesses which might cause serious stress or pressure.
