Sced, A Real Champ!

There was no question yesterday in anybody's mind who should be the Canadian junior golf champion. It's Jim Sced of Vancouver who played far better than he had to, to defeat Jackie Bryant of Halifax, 4 and 7.

Sced had had one of these days you dream about, and Jackie was far below his usual game. Bryant said he drove his tee shot into the woods on the seventh hole of the first round and Jim did the same. It was a coincidence however, that Jim came out and won the hole and Sced couldn't find the putting range. It was the same for the rest of the day as Sced led from the start.

For Sced it was a great climax to a great season of golf. For Bryant it was a disappointment because he felt his best sought Canadian championship would come his way. Two years ago he had reached the semi-finals and last year he made the semi-finals.

The championships went off very smoothly at Belvedere. The Royal Canadian Golf Association seemed quite pleased with the meet. And the Pepsi people said they thought things went well. All the golfers I spoke to liked the course but for one factor they thought the greens were a little hard and quite often their approach shots wouldn't hold.

Ezinicki Defending

BILL EZINICKI, former National Hockey League star, returns the second day of play at Saint John's Exhibition Open golf tournament by trying to defend his title and go on to Moncton tomorrow in defence of his Moncton Open crown.

Ending his new teaching job at the new Seabury Country Club in Massachusetts, has won the Saint John tournament for the past two years and hasn't been beaten in the Moncton Open for three years.

The sharp-shooting Ezinicki fired a practice round four-under-par 67, at Saint John Thursday—Only one stroke off the course record.

The Exhibition Open offers \$1,000 to the winner plus the next best money winner will split \$3,000. There are 29 pros and 173 amateurs are entered. At Moncton, the top five of 24 pros will split \$800 in prize money. Approximately 200 are expected.

Bill Bowling, Belvedere pro, is entered in both meets as are Ron Giesey and Mack Kennedy, both second division; Joe Mally three division; and Lewis Giesey, fourth division; and Ed Havelock, Belvedere pro.

Prince Edward Island, just having completed its last major national junior golf event, has the annual Green Gobles Open going today, Monday and Sunday at Cavendish. A list of close to 300 entries is expected for the meet.

Turner, who has reached Canadian Legion first-class standards in the 100, 200, 400 yard dashes and shot put, is rated one of the outstanding female athletes in the Maritime and one of the best in the country.

The 17-year-old Shelburne native won the 100 yd. and shot put at the Olympic trials and was outstanding at the Canadian Class Championships held in Winnipeg last weekend.

MAKE SAME SALARY

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)—Alex Faulkner says he definitely will not rejoin the National Hockey League this year.

The only Newfoundland player to make the NHL said in a telephone interview from his home at Harbor Grace, Friday he talked to Sid Abel, manager of the Detroit Red Wings yesterday. Abel told him if he did report this week he probably would be unmarked for service with Pittsburgh of the American League, a Detroit team.

"I will be playing this year with the Cape Breton Ice Caps," he said. "I had quite a bit of trouble last year and at 21 I know that once you are down, it is a pretty hard to get up again."

With the Capebees he will join his older brother, George, playing coach of the team and a former member of the Shawinigan Falls Cataracts of the Quebec Hockey League in the Montreal Canadiens farm system. Another possibility for the Capebees is younger brother Jack who played last year with the Johnstown Jets of the International League.

Alex said he had other reasons for staying in Newfoundland. "I hope to get word soon from the business plan to join here," he said. "If this comes through, I will mean I will settle here in Harbor Grace for good."

Howie Meeker, a former NHL star with Toronto and now a sports commentator with a local radio station, says Alex Faulkner is just what the NAHA needs.

"He will raise the level of hockey here," Meeker said. "But the other teams are going to take a whipping in the process. This is just what they need. They have been trying to raise the level of hockey here but it can't be done if someone like Faulkner doesn't start the ball rolling." Meeker is playing coach with St. John's of the All-Newfoundland League.

Jim Sced, lanky six-foot, six-year-old Vancouver, administered a resounding 8 and 7 defeat Friday to Jack Bryant of Halifax and won the Canadian junior golf championship with surprising ease.
