THE DISASTER TO THE DERBYSHIRES.

Methuen Was Unable to Come up.

BULLER EXPERIENCES ONLY SLIGHT OPPOSITION!

He Makes a Most Important Strategical Movement.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

DISASTER TO THE DERBYSHIRES.

LONDON, June 12.—Every one expected that an attempt would be made to cut off Lord Roberts' communications, extending as they do over so many miles in an imperfectly conquered country.

The matter is, however, far more grave than that. It is not only a case of twenty miles of the railway between America siding and Rooval being almost completely destroyed, but the Fourth Derbyshire Battalion of Militia has been overpowered and the Colonel killed and prisoners to the number of about six hundred are in the Boer's hands.

The catastrophe is much more serious for the British than the capture of Spragg and his Yeomanry. In the one case as in the other, Lord Methuen was unable to come up in time to prevent the disaster. Though the wording of the message is somewhat obscure, the War Office, it appears, is certain that the whole of the militia battalion has been captured with the exception of six of the rank and file who are at Major Stoneham's hospital at Rhenoster river.

BULLER'S COUP.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS, Drakensburg, Orange River Colony, June 9.—General Buller, instead of trying to force a passage through Laing's Nek, as the Boers anticipated he would do with Hildyard's division, experienced but slight opposition in going to the top of the Drakensburg by way of Botha's Pass.

It was found that the pass en route, taken by the retreating Boers, had been fired.

The route was covered with dense smoke and darkness. This prevented any further pursuit.

This success of General Buller's strategical movement turns the Boer right and must compel them to evacuate their position at Majuba Hill and Laing's Nek.

Intense Hostility to Foreigners—Britain and the Powers United—Except Russia!

LONDON, June 12.—A special despatch from Shanghai says: "All the naval forces, except the Russians, are acting under the orders of the British admiral."

It has been reported that the head of a foreigner has been seen exposed on a pole northwest of Tien Tsin.

The Chinese are fleeing from Pekin and Tien Tsin to Shanghai.

There are ominous indications of outbreaks in the Yang Tse district.

All classes of natives in the north display an intense hostility toward foreigners, and the Chinese soldiers point their guns at them as they pass.

Martin gives a general denial.
