Dear Mary Haworth: Probably you would do a good turn to a lot of unattached women by warning them against a too aggressive marrying interest in their men friends.

I am a widower, 70, with an adequate but not large income and I have no intention of remarrying. It would seem presumptuous of me to volunteer this information as soon as I pay some attention to a woman.

Yet in three instances recently, embarrassment followed my reticence on that point. Each of the women indicated that I had misled her wrongfully, by taking up her time if my purpose wasn't serious.

THE TRUTH came out after each woman had asked indirectly if I would marry her. Each woman is a widow, nearly my age, and of good intelligence and secure financial competence.

Certainly I don't kid myself that all this fuss is due to any great personal attractiveness of mine. Loneliness is quite understandable; so, too, is fear of incapacity in old age. But who can foresee the future or outwit fate?

Persons our age are too old to be ruled by the instinctive hunger of youth. And these older women defeat themselves in their quest for companionship by refusing to accept the half-loaf of friendship when the whole loaf of marriage isn't offered.

THERE HAVEN'T been any downright refusals but a man is properly reluctant to associate with a woman if it makes her more gloomy than happy.

Some few women have fallen in line quite amicably with my ideas of a pleasant friendship, including moderate manifestations of affection—based on mutual understanding, that marriage isn't in the cards. This attitude has benefited both parties. What is your comment?

Dear B. J.: It is my guess that you are kidding yourself, more or less, about the gist of your quarrels with your disgruntled girl friends.

It probably isn't so much your non-marrying intent that fuels their anger, as it is your mocher interests in building up a "moderate exchange of affection" as a main feature of your association with them.

One can imagine that in the preliminary rounds of getting to know you, they may respond so, to your affectional overtures, on the happy assumption

that it means you have a special feeling of kinship for them. BUT WHEN THEY discover, by indirect inquiry, that you aren't the least interested in them, individually, but rather just killing time in their company, exploiting them as a transient diversion in your empty life, they feel hurt, humiliated, scandalized and furious—all in a flash.

I don't wonder the little house of cards comes tumbling down, leaving you in the market for a new girl friend.

I think your argument, above, is chiefly an attempt to persuade yourself that there's nothing wrong with your coldly opportunistic, self-serving pursuit of women nowadays.

IF IT IS INDEED true that you don't intend to marry again, a resolve that is contrary to normal feeling—even the Bible says it is not good for man to live alone—then I think you ought to seek companionship in social groups, not in tete-a-tete sessions with lonely widows.

Any girls who accept you on your present terms must be sadly at a loss for something to do.
