FIGHTING THE ASHANTIS.

Governor of the Gold Coast Colony Wounded During a Sortie.

Accra, June 21.—Sir Frederick Hodgson, governor of Gold Coast Colony, according to reports from Kumassi, was wounded in the shoulder during a recent sortie from the fort. It is also rumored that eight officers were killed.

Provisions at Kumassi are scarce and there are many wounded. The investment is so complete that no one is able to leave. Great privations are endured by the native population. Day by day the position is becoming more precarious; and there are no prospects of relief.

FILIPINOS TIRED OF THE WAR

And are Anxious For Peace With Hongr.

MANILA, June 21.—Two hundred Filipinos met this morning in Manila to determine honorable and decorous methods for securing peace.

The results were submitted this evening to General MacArthur, who accepted them.

The leaders of the meeting will use their influence to induce Aguinaldo to accept the arrangement. If they are successful, as they hope to be, they believe Aguinaldo will issue orders in conjunction with the American authorities for the cessation of hostilities.

AGAINST THE CLERGY.

SIR.—It is surprising that Premier Farquharson should lay himself open to the charge of attempting to offend the clergy of all denominations in this province. But it seems that they are not the class of people he wishes to associate with, and he is not particular whether he pleases them or not. About a year ago he dismissed from office a faithful servant—a minister of the Presbyterian Church—thereby offending not only the people of that denomination but all right-thinking people of every creed. But his latest insult to one of the Roman Catholic clergy is something that will not pass unnoticed or unheeded. What is the reason that the distribution of the paupers' grant has been taken out of the hands of the Rev. Dr. Chaisson and given to H. J. Pineau? Is it because the rev. gentleman could not be trusted? Is it because they had no faith in the most respected of clergy, or is it because they thought that he would give it to the deserving poor?—perhaps to old women who had no votes, and that the partizan purpose intended to be served by the money voted by this pure and honest administration would thus be disregarded. No reason that can be given is sufficient to shield the government from the suspicion of a deliberate attempt to insult the Rev. Dr. Chaisson.

What will the country think of a government that have a better opinion of a political Judas than they have of the faithful servant of Him who was betrayed? There can only be one answer to this question, and that answer will come in a constitutional way, and the Premier will find out what he is thought of when it will be too late to remedy his mistakes. But in the meantime whatever the Premier says is done; and he will find soon that it is too late in the nineteenth century to attempt to introduce into the country the despotic rule of Russia.

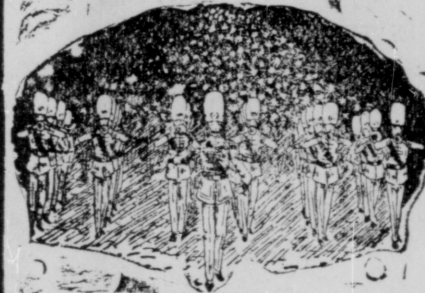

LIGHTNING.—A very heavy thunder storm passed over this section of the province Thursday afternoon. A good many of the telephones in town were burned out, and some of the country lines are still interrupted. A barn at the head of Grandville Street, owned by Mr. N. Sinclair and used as a warehouse, was struck and damaged. The lightning struck the peak of the roof, at one end of the building, and tore off a strip of shingles right to the ground. It also split one of the rafters from end to end, and tore out one part of it. At O'Leary, it is reported, there was a heavy fall of hail.—Agriculturist.

MASONIC FESTIVAL.—Tomorrow the Masons of Charlottetown will celebrate the Festival of John the Baptist by attending in a body at St. Paul's Church. A sermon suitable to the occasion will be preached by Rev. Leo Williams. This is also the 25th anniversary of the formation of the Lodge of Prince Edward Island and is therefore a day of much importance among the Masons of the Province. The officers of the Grand Lodge will march with the members and officers of the two city Lodges, and it is expected that there will be a large representation of members of other Lodges. Visiting and non-affiliated brethren are invited to participate in the celebration.

METHODIST CONFERENCE.—The first session of the N. B. and P. E. Island general conference was held at Moncton on Thursday, the President, Rev. G. M. Campbell, in the chair. The opening sermon was preached by Rev. Dr. Brecken. The membership at present is 13,638, a decrease from last year of 30. The number of infant baptisms last year was 857; adults 118; marriages, 374; burials, 673. Resolutions were adopted restoring Rev. W. W. Brewer to the privileges of the ministry after the second Sunday in July and that he be placed under superintendence during the conference year. The ministers in session by resolution considered Mr. Brewer's suspension for ten months sufficient penalty and rejoiced with him in a moral victory. Rev. J. J. Teasdale was added to the supernumerary list. The report of the missionary committee showed a net decrease of receipts for the year of \$325.05. The St. John District had an increase of \$7,043; Fredericton an increase of \$10,633; Woodstock a decrease of \$84,800; Chatham a decrease of \$24,944; Sackville a decrease of \$1,119; St. Stephen a decrease of \$256,16; Summerside a decrease of \$22,21. Rev. Neil McLaughlin, of Summerside, delivered an address in the interest of missions.
