After Charlottetown, Miss Oliver will continue her examination duties in Fredericton and in two weeks will "go back home to London to teach some more."

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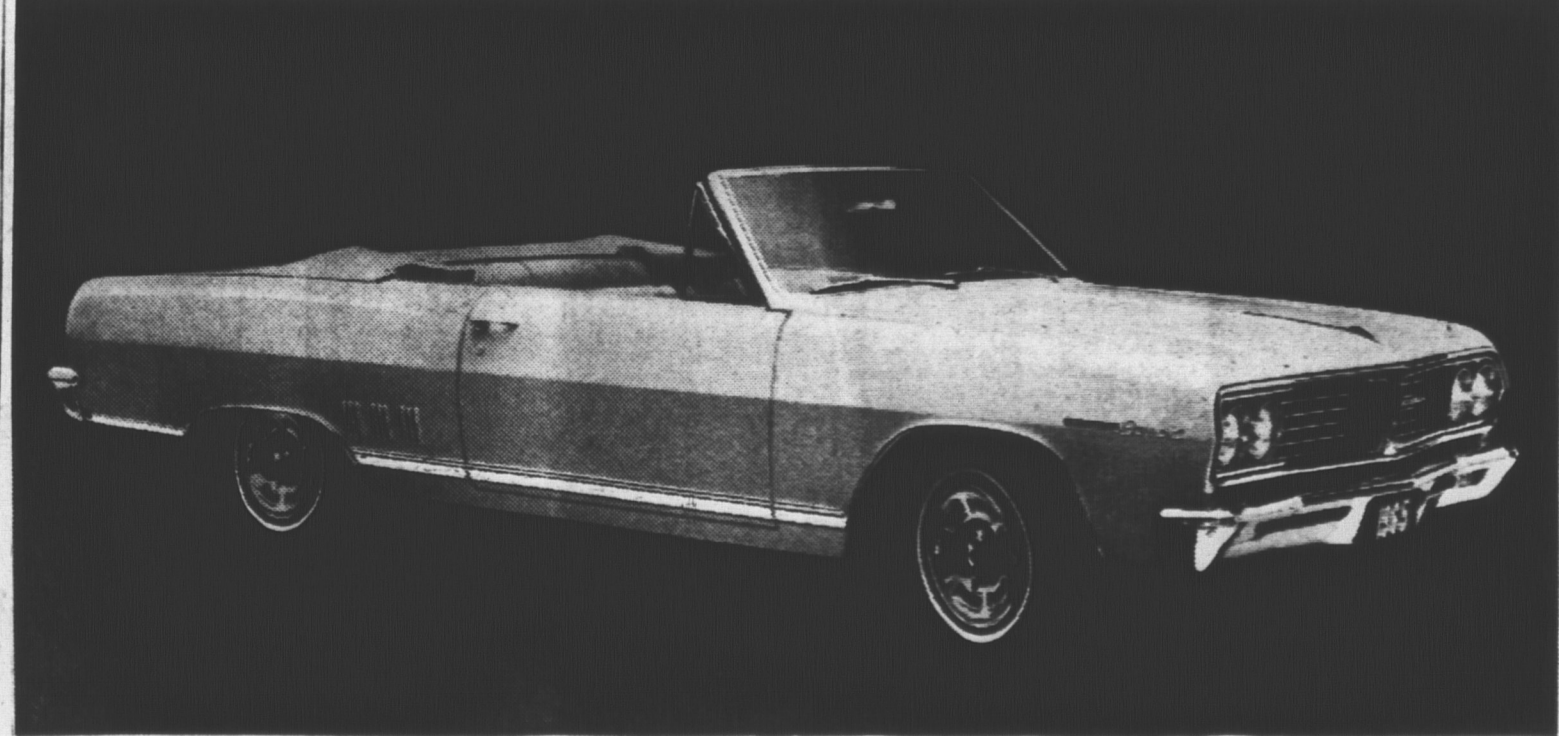

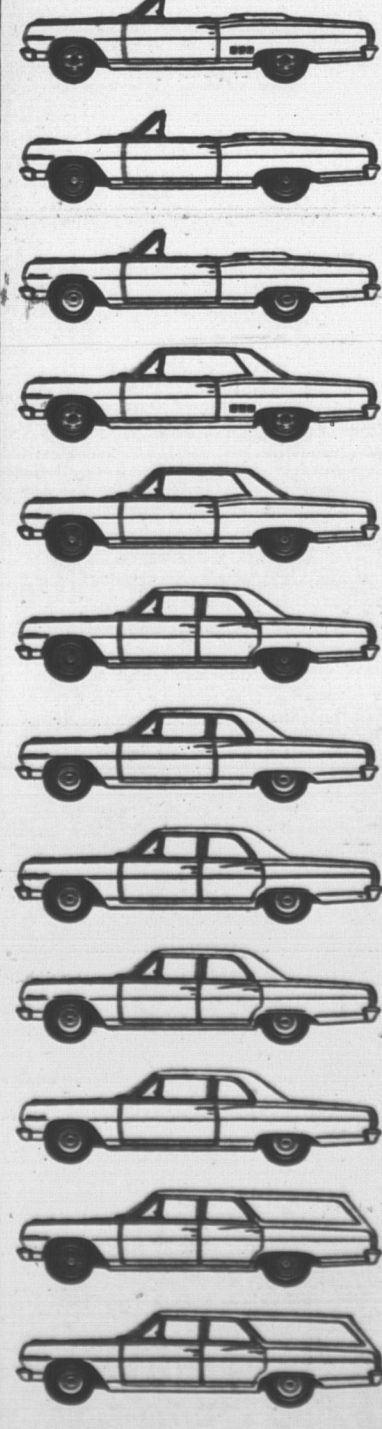
