MISS SARAH MACDONALD The death of Miss Sarah MacDonald at the home of her niece, Mrs. Syl MacAulay, Campbell's Cove, P.E.I., on Monday August 16, 1954, removes from this district a highly respected resident. As the shadows of evening fell with a peaceful calm over the countryside, so did the spirit of this gentle lady leave its mortal abode, strengthened by the last consolatory rites of Holy Mother Church which, during her long life she loved and served so faithfully. The late Miss MacDonald was born at Lakeville, P.E.I. 82 years ago. In her early life she went to the U.S.A. and for many years was employed with the firm of R. H. White and Co., Boston, Mass. Failing health made it necessary for her to retire to her Island home and she spent the remaining years with her brother, Columbia MacDonald, Lakeville, and with her sister, Mrs. Eugene Fay, East Baltic. When they passed away in 1943, she lived with her nephew, John B. Fay, at latter times, Mrs. MacAulay, who so tenderly cared for her in her last illness and with such unselfish devotion, leaving nothing undone that might in any way allay the sufferings of her "dear aunt Sadie." The late Miss MacDonald possessed rare intellect; she was an ardent reader, a lover of poetry and could quote fluently from the classics. United Church General Council's 16th Biennial Conference Concludes

By RAE CORELLI Canadian Press Staff Writer SACKVILLE, N. B. (CP)—The highest court of the United Church of Canada adjourned its 16th biennial conference Friday convinced that a new-style evangelism unrestricted by denominational borders is the sole hope of mankind.

The 375 clergymen and laymen who represented the church's 11 conferences on the general council met in the big white frame Sackville United Church with the Unitarian theme of the August World Council of Churches, "Christ, the hope of the world," preoccupying their day-after day.

Dr. George Dorey of Toronto, the Channel Islander and onetime Methodist who was elevated to the moderatorship at the opening meeting Sept. 15, defined the feeling as "a spirit of unity" which he said must be encompassing or "all churches of the Christian religion" would fail.

The subject of union closer to home came up with the report of the commission that has been holding periodic talks with the Church of England toward an eventual organic merger. The report said the talks had bogged down partly because the mass of the people in each communion had yet to face "frankly the adjustments and modifications necessary for each 'and the policy to achieve it.'"

NEED FOR UNITY EMPHASIZED BY UNITED CHURCH MODERATOR

The 16th general council of the United Church of Canada, the country's largest Protestant denomination, concluded a far-reaching 10-day conference in the New Brunswick University town of Sackville Friday. Here is an account by Dr. George Dorey of Toronto, the moderator, of what he regards as the achievements.

Instalment Plan Buying Drops

OTTAWA (CP)—Buying on the instalment plan took a decided dip in the second quarter of 1954 as Canadians cut purchases of automobiles and other goods. Total retail sales—both cash and credit—eased by \$53,200,000 in the April-June period to \$2,128,100,000 from \$2,181,300,000 in the similar 1953 period, the bureau of statistics reported Thursday.

DRINK STAND MAINTAINED

The 10 days saw the church reaffirm its long-standing and blanket opposition to drinking, gambling and Sunday sports. The latter brought it into conflict with Ontario's Lord's Day Act of 1950 which permits for instance, baseball on Sunday. As a corollary, the council urged the CBC to call a halt to telecasting Ottawa, Montreal and Toronto Sunday football games.

The conference liked the minimum annual salary for ministers from \$2,700 to \$2,800 effective next year and pledged itself toward a minimum of \$3,000 as quickly as possible. Car allowances were also raised.

Other benefits were created when the delegates approved a radically different pension plan which will make pension payments more liberal than the present plan. The pension will be based on a minimum of \$3,000 as quickly as possible. Car allowances were also raised.

CONTROVERSIAL BOOKLET One of the most controversial issues arising from the entire conference was created by a booklet that purported to define the differences in the Protestant and Roman Catholic faiths. The booklet, prepared by a special council-appointed commission, was criticized as an attack on the Roman church although delegates insisted that was not the purpose behind its creation.

Perhaps one of the most significant reports tabled originated with the committee on civil religion liberty which reported that "for the most part" Roman Catholics and Protestants, French and English-speaking Canadians now enjoy "friendly and tolerant relationships" in Quebec province.
