punishment because of a fear that abolition would mean an influx of United States gangsters into Canada.

The possibility of execution was an effective deterrent against murder, a nasty and harsh crime which deserved nasty and harsh punishment.

The law at present provided enough safeguards against execution for non-gangster murderers—persons who kill in a moment of passion and the like. He saw no benefit in establishing varying degrees of murder and punishment.

SHARED HIS VIEWS - The commissioner, a veteran of 30 years in the RCMP, urged judges be given the discretion to impose corporal punishment for especially vicious crimes, such as assault on old persons and young girls.

He said that although he has not made a survey of his officers' opinions, he believed that many shared his views on capital and corporal punishment and lotteries.

The method of capital punishment—hanging in Canada—should be under continual review. He said he hopes that some day society will have advanced enough to allow abolition of capital punishment.

However, at present, it was a necessary part of the administration of justice in Canada.

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Holiday Death Toll Reaches 60

By The Canadian Press - The Victoria day holiday weekend brought violent death to 60 Canadians. This was six more than during the same week-end last year, a Canadian Press compilation showed. The count covered the period from the start of holiday travel at 6 p.m. local time, Friday until 6 a.m. Monday when most of the celebrants had returned home.

The compilation listed 25 fatalities in Ontario, 18 in Quebec, five each in British Columbia and New Brunswick, three in Nova Scotia, two in Alberta and one each in Newfoundland and Manitoba. They included 26 traffic deaths and 13 drownings.

Paris in about a week. When someone asked whether she would accept the \$100,000 offered by publishers, newspapers, radio and television networks for the story of her ordeal under fire, the 29-year-old air force nurse said: "This isn't the time for that. I will think it over when I reach Paris."

Genevieve looked a far cry from the dishevelled girl in mud splashed parachutist's uniform and canvas shoes who arrived in Hanoi Monday night. A new hairdo, a trim blue linen suit and eight hours' solid sleep had transformed the heroine of Dien Bien Phu into a chic Parisienne.

But despite her smart clothes and first make-up in weeks, she was thin and pale—evidence of her five weeks as the only woman in the ill-fated jungle fortress and, later, her 17 days as a prisoner of the Vietnamese. She refused Tuesday to discuss the Vietnam Communists because "the press might misunderstand my meaning and risk the safety of the wounded still at Dien Bien Phu."

She added: "It is not because I have had things to say about the Vietnam!" She did say the Vietnamese rebels had treated her "correctly."

"I feel a mixture of joy and sadness at being in Hanoi—joy at seeing my friends, sadness at leaving behind so many of the

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
