Protest New Cut In Cigaret Prices

MONTREAL (CP)—An official of the Retail Tobacco Association Tuesday protested against a decision by major chain stores to again reduce their price on a pack of cigarettes from 37 cents to 35 cents.

H. J. Gofink, honorary president of the association, said the latest decision will put the small merchant in the position of again having to face the \$3.30-a-carton price level on cigarettes for which he pays \$3.31 to the wholesaler.

The national chain grocers stopped selling cigarettes last week. However they again reduced the price after rivals which had not increased the price began drawing customers from the national chains.

The 37-cent price includes a 10-per-cent provincial tax.

Labor Income Shows Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—Labor income in the first half of 1954 rose by \$93,000,000 over the amount for a similar period last year.

The bureau of statistics Tuesday reported the total at \$5,767,000,000 compared with \$5,674,000,000 in the corresponding 1953 months.

This year the estimate number of workers with jobs averaged one per cent below the first six months of 1953, but per capita weekly earnings were 2.5 per cent higher. June earnings were \$1,000,000,000, up from \$975,000,000 in May and from \$981,000,000 a year earlier.

Average weekly earnings for June in the major non-farm industries were \$58.94, compared with \$57.57 a year earlier.

Labor income for the half-year by industrial groups, with the corresponding figures for last year in brackets:

- Agriculture, forestry, fishing, trapping and mining, \$395,000,000 (\$400,000,000);
- manufacturing, \$1,937,000,000 (\$1,967,000,000);
- construction, \$360,000,000 (\$377,000,000);
- utilities, transportation, communications, storage, trade, \$1,500,000,000 (\$1,462,000,000);
- finance, services, \$1,372,000,000 (\$1,280,000,000);
- supplementary labor income, \$203,000,000 (\$202,000,000).

Stresses Value Of Physical Training

A strong physical education program makes for a strong Y.M.C.A. and offers one of the best possible mediums for character building and Christian educational activities with youth, according to J. Wesley McVicar, Y.M.C.A. National Secretary for Physical Education.

In an address before a well-attended special dinner meeting of the board of directors and key leaders of the Charlottetown Y.M.C.A. held last evening at the Queen Hotel.

Bringing greetings from the National Council staff, Mr. McVicar congratulated the local Association on showing the way to other Associations in the Maritimes and across Canada in the matter of providing adequate facilities for youth services.

The 'Y' had pioneered or supported many worthwhile activities in Canada, including Boy Scouting, Tuxis Trail Rangers, organized camping, swimming, life-saving and physical fitness programs, standards and methods, and there was need to continue and extend this spirit, stated Mr. McVicar.

Recent years had seen informal activities replacing the former pattern of rigid physical fitness activities, but he felt the pendulum is beginning to swing back now to some extent. Some old timers might feel the 'Y' had slipped in dropping some of its older program patterns, but the facts showed that all across the country the 'Y' was richer and stronger in membership, program, and in facilities than ever before.

As priorities for the future he suggested the following as guides; keep program focused on the interests and needs of youth, keep it informal and elastic, provide opportunities for developing special interests, meet real life situations in program, provide opportunity for the enriching experience of service to others, develop Christian-motivated leaders for the future.

OUTSTANDING REPRESENTATION OF GENERAL COUNCIL CLERGY & LAYMEN

The task of providing accommodation for some 375 delegates of the 16th General Council of the United Church of Canada which meets at Sackville, N.B., next week is a large one for the planning committee and the preparations required to move this large body of people to Prince Edward Island on the afternoon of the 18th has fallen largely to Mr. Sydney T. Green, Charlottetown, who is the island member of that committee.

The Campus and the halls of Mount Allison University will buzz with activity for ten days starting September 15th. The Council will have in attendance an equal number of the most prominent laymen and clergy from Newfoundland to British Columbia and will be headed by the Moderator, Right Rev. A. A. Scott, D.D. A new Moderator will be elected at the General Council which is the supreme governing body of the Church. Although it is generally assumed that the person elected to this high office is a member of the ministerial Commission, there is nothing to bar the election of a layman whom the Council would consider worthy of carrying out these duties.

In addition to the ex-officio members including the Moderator, the secretary and the treasurer, ministerial and non-ministerial delegates from eleven Conferences will attend. These include Newfoundland, the Maritimes, Montreal and Ottawa, Bay of Quinte, Toronto, Hamilton, London, Manitoba, Saskatchewan, Alberta and British Columbia Conferences.

Island Commissioners will include Rev. J. Murdoch Fraser, Montague; Rev. A. S. Weir, D. D., Cornwall; Mr. W. R. Shaw, Saint Catharines; R. A. Proffitt, Freetown and G. Russell Laird, Howlan, past president of the Lay Association. Mr. Sydney T. Green is a commissioner at large at the Council.

A cross section of business and professional life in Canada will be represented in those attending the sessions and many of the clergy are island born or have at times held charges in this province.

Among the ministerial delegates from the Maritime Conference will be Very Rev. C. M. Nicholson, past moderator of the General Council, and Principal of Pine Hill Divinity Hall, Rev. A. E. Kerr, president of Dalhousie University, Halifax; Rev. W. T. R. Fleming, president of Mount Allison University; Rev. William Briggs, past president of the Maritime Conference and at one time a student minister at New London; Rev. James A. Fraser, Imperial, N. S., president of the Maritime Conference. Two laymen, Rev. H. M. Davis of Yarmouth, N. S. and Rev. Walter G. Davis of Fredericton will meet at the Council. Rev. S. M. MacDowell of Dominion, N. S. and a native of Pleasant Valley will be one of the Commissioners. He has a brother, Rev. Alex MacDowell preaching at Montrose.

Non-ministerial Commissioners from the Maritime Conference include Dr. G. L. Gass of Tatamagouche, N. S. and for many years a prominent practicing physician in Sackville, N. B.; Dr. J. S. Munroe, North Sydney, N.S.; Mrs. Christine Macinnis, registrar at Mount Allison and the widow of a United Church minister; Raymond G. Smith, the recent chairman of the Pine Hill Drive and a prominent worker in the Y.M.C.A. and M.R.C.

The Montreal and Ottawa Conference will be headed by that well known preacher and educationalist, Rev. J. S. Thompson, who is principal of the United Church Theological Seminary, Montreal and was a former president of the University of Saskatchewan; professor at Pine Hill and prominent C.B.C. governor, Rev. Mr. Thompson will be accompanied by Rev. Norman Coll, a native of Cape Breton and former Chief Protestant chaplain of the R.C.A.F. for six years during World War II. Also attending from the same Conference will be Rev. G. G. D. Kilpatrick who is famous in the field of education at Montrose.

The Bay of Quinte Conference will include in its delegates, Rev. Harold E. Wright, formerly of Charlottetown, now preaching at Norwood, Ontario and Rev. George Telford, Oshawa who is a past president of that conference and a former minister at Saint Pauls Church, Fredericton, N. B.

Another island minister is among the commissioners from the Toronto Conference. He is Rev. Roy Webster of Marie, Mr. Webster was a missionary in China until the Communists took over the country. Others in the Toronto Conference are Rev. E. M. Howse who is a graduate of Pine Hill and was successor to Rev. J. S. Bonnell at Winnipeg and Rev. E. Crossley Hunter whose father was a member of the famous evangelistic team of Crossley-Hunter.

Non ministerial commissioners from Toronto include such prominent laymen as Harold Arnpup who is a son of Jesse Arnpup, for years head of the Home Missions Board, the largest spending organization within the church, Mr. J. Gordon Coburn is a son of the late Rev. John Coburn, noted preacher, author and lecturer. Mr. Coburn is a personnel relations director with the Department of Labor, Mr. Walter B. Cowan is a prominent lawyer from Toronto who will be accompanied by Mr. A. E. Brude who has been outstanding on the Missionary and Maintenance Board. Very prominent of Toronto University, Dr. Smith was at one time on the faculty of Dalhousie University.

HEADS HAMILTON CONFERENCE

The Hamilton Conference will be headed by Rev. E. Melville Aitken, D.D. formerly of this City and at present minister at First United Church, Hamilton. Dr. Aitken will be accompanied by another Island born minister, Rev. Elmer Ashley of Alberton and Rev. Arthur Organ who once held a pastorate at Beauceux. Another prominent minister from the Hamilton area is Rev. H. G. Forster who works with the non-Anglo-Saxon population in Welland, Ont.

Two outstanding members of the lay delegates from Hamilton Conference are Mr. W. W. Brown who was one of the prime movers in the organization of the laymen of the United Church in Canada. He will have with him Mr. F.R. Murgatroyd a prominent Hamilton lawyer.

Little is known of the commissioners who will attend from West of Hamilton but in the Alberta Conference delegates there will be Rev. J. G. Gardiner who is a nephew of Rev. George Tilley, retired minister at Pownall and first cousin of Mrs. T. M. Lothian of this City. Chief Judge N. V. Buchanan will head the lay delegates from this conference. Judge Buchanan's father was one of the pioneer ministers of the West. Another prominent layman from Calgary, Alta., is Mr. I. C. Robison who has been representative of the United Church at the World Council of Churches at Amsterdam and at Evanston, Illinois. Mr. Robison is said to be the most likely candidate for moderator, should a layman be elected to that office.

Increase Noted In School Enrollment

Following close on the heels of carpenters, painters and equipment men who had been putting the finishing touches on the class rooms and other essential at the new Queen Charlotte High School, 420 students were enrolled and assigned to their classes yesterday morning.

The attendance is composed almost equally of boys and girls, with 208 of the former and 212 of the latter registered. The building was made available for classes just two days short of one year from the day the contract was let. A grand total of 2,506 pupils were enrolled in the combined city

Normal Training Students Fewer

The number of Normal Training students registering at Prince of Wales College yesterday was 42, a drop of 20 over the previous year. It is pointed out that since the regulation calling for junior matriculation went into effect last year a great many of the students anticipating the teacher training course will remain in their home school to qualify in this respect before coming for the Normal Training Course at P.W.C. It can be assumed therefore that the number enrolling in this class will be up considerably next year.

In fourth year, seven students registered for the Arts course while 23 have enrolled in science, making a total of 30. Third year students are divided as follows, Arts, 16; science, 31 and pre-engineering, 15; total 62. There have been 98 registered for second year academic work and 67 in the graduating Commerce course. This makes the number enrolled, exclusive of first year, 289.

Regular first years and last year commerce students will be enrolled this afternoon at 2 p.m. It is expected that these will number in the vicinity of 200.

RESUMES RAFT JOURNEY

NEW HAVEN, Eng. (Reuters)—A 21-year-old German bartender Thursday night resumed his round-the-world raft voyage. The voyage Wolfgang Krakauer von Schwarzenfeld turned up earlier at Alderney Channel islands, a few hours after being reported missing in rough seas in the English channel. Schwarzenfeld left here three days ago bound for Brest, France, on a 10,000-mile trip to Australia.

SOLDIER GETS DEATH

MUNICH (Reuters)—A 30-year-old American soldier, sergeant Robert K. McMahan, of Willington, N. C., Thursday was sentenced to death by a court martial here for shooting a 68-year-old German taxi-driver, Karl Kaiser, on July 10.
