LAST NIGHT'S HOCKEY.

WANDERERS AND ABEGWEITS MEET AT THE RINK.

The Score: Wanderers 5; Abegweits 4—A Grand Game—Great Excitement.

Expectation, anxiety, and the desire for victory were indicated in most of the faces that lined the rink last night just before the Wanderers, of Halifax, and our team, the Abegweits, lined up to decide the matter of superiority.

It must not be supposed, however, that the spirit of fairplay was absent. Allowances were being made for the three battles already fought by the visitors, and for their having to fight our crack team—who were practically fresh.

When the Wanderers took the ice it was apparent that they required no sympathy. They were thoroughly fit.

The rink was crowded. Men, women, girls, young men and boys were all there, manifesting an eagerness for the beginning of the game. They were one and all animated with a loyal desire for the success of the home team. They gave evidence that at the slightest provocation they were ready to give expression to their pent-up feelings.

Later on, when they had the opportunity, they roared like a cyclone.

At 8.15 o'clock the referee (Dr. H. D. Johnson) called the men out. The ice was perfect, the light good. Ham Bethune placed himself in front of the Abegweits' goal, Clarkson did the same for the Wanderers, and the men stood at attention.

Then the puck was dropped, and every eye was on it as it went up into the Abegweits' end of the rink. Here it stayed for nearly five minutes, our boys playing on the defensive, but not preventing a goal by the Wanderers, which was very cleverly made.

There was no sound of revelry just then, save from one or two Nova Scotians, who rejoiced by themselves in a "splendid isolation."

Play was promptly resumed, but the puck would stay near the Abegweits' goal. The Wanderers were as nimble as acrobats, and the way they held on to the puck was beautiful. Our boys, however, were waking up, and one by one giving evidence of ability. Sullivan got the puck and brought it away from home, and then Unsworth got it and made a good dash. On both occasions the roar of the cyclone was heard. The Wanderers, however, forced it back and the four died down. Howatt here made some fine play, but the feature of the game at this time was Bethune's good stopping. Then suddenly the puck was sent back, and like a flash Sullivan got it when near the Wanderers' posts and sent it through.

Goal for the Abegweits! The cyclone broke loose.

The puck was again quickly in the struggle, and the play was now principally in the middle of the rink with an occasional shot towards Bethune who prevented its entrance until half time was sounded and greeted with yells of satisfaction.

The score was 1-1. The play had been vigorous and clever on the part of the visitors while our men perhaps showed more caution than enterprise. But they had put more ginger into their play during the latter part of the half and when the bell rang the audience were hopeful.

After the throw down for the second half the puck was kept rather more in the middle of the rink, but it was again and again forced up to the Abegweits where in spite of Bethune's good guarding the combination play of the Wanderers won two goals in succession. It was impossible not to admire the dexterity of the Halifax men and their thorough knowledge of the game. They captured the puck so quickly and combined with such facility, that their work was perfect.

The score was now 3-1, and Charlottetown was in partial eclipse.

A struggle now began that gave the spectators the finest display of hockey that has been seen in Hillsborough Rink. The puck for a minute or two was on Abegweit ice, but it found fiercer men there than formerly. There was some rapid play while one could count ten and then a goal was made by Unsworth for the Abegweits.

And the crowd stood up and yelled. Before the shout died away the puck was again flying hither and thither but the

hockey sticks of the Abegweits held on to it this time and in less than a couple of minutes it shot between the Wanderer's posts again and gave another goal to the Abegweits. Howatt did the trick this time.

The crowd. They stood up again—the most of them—and yelled louder than before. The goal was 3-3 and the eclipse was over.

Down went the puck again and so quickly that one had hardly time to think the Wanderers made another goal. It was now a fast and furious fight, and in less than a minute the Abegweits scored again.

The score was even, and the roars that went up shook the rafters. The Abegweits were now playing a game not out whit inferior to their opponents. McMillan, Sullivan, Flood, Carbonnell and Howatt had caught the pace and their work was splendid.

Time was getting short now and the puck was smartly thrown down to pursue its troubled course. This time the Wanderers hugged it closely and under their skillful performance, it found its way over Bethune's guard making the score 5-4.

At this juncture the Wanderers seemed to think time was up and they were leaving the ice. The referee brought them back for about two minutes play during which the Abegweits strove but in vain to score. The bell rang to close the half just as the game was in its most interesting stage, and the Abegweit men were playing like heroes. But there is no appeal against Time, and the teams after cheering for each other withdrew.

After all, the score is one to be proud of. Five to four is not bad when we consider that the victors are the champions of Nova Scotia.

As regards criticism of the teams it must be confessed that the Wanderers possess wonderful agility, developed by much practice together, and their tactics are superb. On the other hand our men are fully their equals in ability and pluck, and probably their superiors in staying abilities. After our Abegweits have played a few more matches we would like to see them meet the Wanderers again.

Let us have more hockey. It is a glorious game.
