## IN MEMORIAM

HUGH MCAULAY

Mr. Hugh McAulay, carriage builder and one of the largest and most extensive farmers in the Souris district, passed away on Wednesday after several weeks illness. He was in the 76th year of his age and carried on carriage building for almost 50 years and turned out of his shops in that time hundreds of wagons; sleighs; farm gear etc. He partially retired from this business about five years ago but still continued to do repair work for his old customers. Besides building up this extensive business he accumulated large farm property and erected splendid farm buildings and residence. He also accumulated considerable cash and he was at his death one of the most wealthy rural dwellers in the Souris district. He was married in 1873 to Matilda McPhee of Big Pond who predeceased him some dozen years ago. His family consists of Frank on the homestead; Stephen building contractor, and settled near by; Charley building contractor of Denver, Colorado and San Francisco, Cal.; Lottie (Mrs. McIsaac) of Boston; Lizzie trained nurse, Charlottetown; Mary; Mrs. John Campbell, Poplar Point, Kings County and another in the states.

Several other children died in their teens. Mr. Hugh McAulay will be remembered a successful Islander at home. At the early age of 18 years he was left a orphan by the death of his father and with his widowed mother and a small farm of 30 acres he began the battle of life. The farm being small and poor, he began in his early years carpentry work and the building of jaunty sleds and other appliances that would sell to the surrounding farmers; also repair work. Gradually as his age and skill developed he began also building wagons and finer sleighs, at the same time purchasing more land. For many years the late Jno. Kitcham of Souris West did the blacksmithing for him. Usually he built two wagons or sleighs to have one mounted for himself. After a time he bought a blacksmith outfit and put up a forge and all at once and without serving any time at the blacksmithing trade he began mounting his own wagons and sleighs, threshing ma-

chines; truckwagons etc. and doing this work neatly and satisfactorily. Now he had all the profits of the business and wealth came to him. Mr. McAulay was counted by his friends and customers as a straightforward honest man; truthful and a man to his word; well liked by his neighbors; and a strong pillar to his church and in politics an aggressive Conservative, though many of his closest friends were of the Liberal persuasion.

His funeral which was one of the largest for many a day took place to St. Mary's church, Souris, where a High Mass of Requiem was offered by the pastor, Rev. Father McLean.

The death of Kathrine Mathieson, beloved wife of the late Duncan McNaughton, which occurred at her home Keutrye, Winslow Road, on the morning of May the first, in her 75th year, after a painful illness of six months.
