Local and Other Items.

THE PARIS FAIR—The idea of boycotting the Paris Fair seems to have fizzled out. It had its origin in a generous hatred of injustice; but it would have been itself an act of injustice, punishing the innocent along with the guilty.

POULTRY RAISING—Jno. Wheatley, of Charlottetown, will deliver a lecture on the above subject in the new hall at Orwell Cove, on Wednesday evening, 4th Oct., at 7.30 o'clock, and at Eldon Hall on Friday evening at the same hour. Instructions how to raise and feed poultry will be given. Admission free. Forty dollars in cash will be given for the best fatted birds at our warehouse this autumn.

THE YACHT RACE—In the opinion of yachtsmen who have seen both yachts sailing in different weather, the races of the Columbia and the Shamrock will resolve into contests to see which will break down first. In moderate winds both will probably finish—but there are many yachtsmen in New York who fully believe that if a race is sailed in half a gale neither of them will be able to stand the strain, and wreck will result. In case such a misfortune happens, the next cup challenger and defender will be yachts, not skeletons.

REGULATIONS RESCINDED—According to the Railway and Shipping World, the White Pass and Yukon Railway management announces that the regulations of the United States Government, which prevented perishable goods from Canada being bonded through Alaska on the way to the Yukon, have been rescinded. Word has been sent to the collector at Skagway from the Treasury Department, ordering him to pass Canadian perishable goods the same as other Canadian goods, which means that they will go through without interruption.

THOUGHT HIMSELF DEFRAUDED—At a bazaar in connection with a Methodist chapel at Cincinnati, O., several ladies in order to raise money, volunteered to submit to be hugged and kissed by any blind-folded man who choose to pay for the privilege. One of the men, John Reynolds, paid his fifteen cents, and, approaching the women, caught hold of the one right before him and led her out, and kissed and hugged her most boisterously, and evidently enjoyed himself immensely. At the end of five minutes the master of ceremonies notified him that time was up. The bandage was removed from his eyes and he found that the lady locked in his arms was his wife. He demanded his money back, and this being refused, he said he had been defrauded, and sought revenge by upsetting some stalls.

WHAT THE STAR'S FORETELL—Says a London despatch: "Ode of 'Old Moore's' almanacs has already appeared for 1900, and the usual pessimism is laded out in the names of the stars and planets. The astrologer has a great deal to say about Russia and the health of its ruler, storms in March, marriages in July, and the work of Death's scythe in high places. In March there is to be a storm in the Cabinet, and many angry debates in parliament are to come. In the following month one of the great ones of the realm will depart from this earth. The health of the sovereign is twice unfavorably prognosticated. Motor cars, it is said, will increase in thousands. During June and July many fatalities are to occur through them. War, of course, figures nearly every month through various moods of Mars. It will especially threaten in July."

SUSSEX EXHIBITION—The four days exhibition to be held at Sussex this year on October 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th, will be open to the Province. Encouraged by the success of last year the management are erecting another building 40 by 100 feet in addition to the large one put up last year, which will permit a still better display of the products of the farm; and will leave more space in the main building for industrial exhibits. The formal opening will take place at 3 p. m. on Tuesday, October 3rd, Hon. Andrew G. Blair having consented to be present and deliver the opening address. Wednesday October 4th will be the race day, when the splendid new half mile race track (three minutes walk from the station) will be opened and purses aggregating \$600 will be put up. There will be a 2.19, a 2.25 and a 2.37 class, which will bring out most of the best horses in the Maritime Province. On Thursday the cattle sheep and swine will be shown, and on Friday the horses. Special novel attractions are being arranged for. A demonstration of Prof. Robertson's chicken fattening system will be given in the poultry building and will be an interesting feature of the show, as will also be an unequalled agricultural display, for which Sussex Fair is noted. The P. E. I. R., will issue excursion return tickets, good going 3rd to 6th, and for return until 7th at single fare.
