As described by one British correspondent, there was "a certain amount of table-pounding" in the early stages of the Paris talks between Prime Minister Macmillan and Gaillard.

If the furniture actually took a beating, the marks of violence were apparent in the milk-and-water communique that emerged from the talks.

It spoke of "a spirit of solidarity" announced that the solution of the Algerian question lies with France, except that the prime ministers had "decided to make arrangements to avoid the recurrence of difficulties" and went on to speak of plans for next month's NATO conference.

HOSTILE TRAPPINGS

There was no hint of a British apology for the shipment of arms to Tunisia that touched off the dispute, nor of a French demand that Britain send no arms in the future. Whatever soothing effect the conference may have had on ruffled feelings in the Arab world, the Tunisian situation unchanged.

If the meeting itself adjourned in an atmosphere of sweetness and light, its exterior trappings conveyed at least the window-dressing of hostility.

Steel helmeted troops with rifles and machine-guns lined the outer wall of the British Embassy, where the talks were held. A few blocky away, baton-wielding police dispersed small groups of youthful demonstrators in the Place de la Concorde.

STAGED EMOTION

But, despite the undoubted sincerity of the angry young extremists in the streets, it was questionable that French public opinion was living up to its lurid press notices.

A London News Chronicle reporter, in headlines and demonstrations created "a fictitious atmosphere." If there had been direct emoting, the first arm shipments were first announced, it had faded away.

For Gaillard, whose political survival depends on the goodwill of right-wing politicians favoring vigorous prosecution of the war against the Algerian rebels, the evidence of national indignation could do no harm.

Although his own Radical Socialist Party is opposed to the government's present firm line, the street demonstrations with earshot of a visiting British prime minister could not have been more timely.

Satellite Test Rocket Test Now In Position

WASHINGTON (AP)—Dr. John Hagen, director of the Vanguard earth satellite project, said Wednesday the first complete test vehicle is being checked in preparation for launching at Cape Canaveral, Fla.

Hagen told a press conference the test rocket is in a vertical position on its launching stand. But he said the six-inch sphere which the rocket is designed to pull into an orbit around the earth is not yet in place, and will not be installed until the day before the launching.

Because the sphere contains delicate instruments, it will be kept in a blockhouse or hangar as long as possible before being placed in the nose of the rocket.

Hagen, native of Amherst, N.S., said he was unable to give a more definite launching date than "sometime in December."

Other sources have indicated there may be a launching attempt about next Wednesday.
