From Island Boys With Canadian Contingent.

(Continued from page 7) The following is from Private Reginald Cox:

MY DEAR MOTHER.—We expect to meet a steamer one of these days, and I must have a letter ready for you. We are all well. I never was better in my life. I was not a bit sea-sick, but some of the boys had a bad attack for a day or so. One poor fellow died on board, and he was buried at sea. I tell you it was a sad sight to see a body thrown overboard and not a tear shed for him. We do not expect to land at Cape Town until the 28th. We are crowded pretty well on board, but they treat us very well. Dr. Barrie is the officer in charge of the Y. M. C. A. on board. It is fine, no lack of reading matter or writing materials. I will write to all my friends in Charlottetown when I get to the Cape. It is awful hard to write here, so many talking and moving about all the time. Received all your parcels and letters. Thanks.

OFF CAPE VERDE, NOV. 11.—Sighted first land today, Cape Verde Islands. This is the first land I saw for two weeks. We expect to be at Cape Town in two weeks more. There is a steamer coming to take mails, but we are not going to land at Cape Verde at all, so I have not much time. We are all well. I will write you a long letter when I get to the Cape. CHRISTMAS NUMBER.

The Christmas number of the Prince Edward Island Magazine is now out, and it marks a point, in the quality of its articles as well as in its typographical appearance, far in advance of anything yet achieved in this line in this Province.

The table of contents includes articles of historic worth in the contributions on "Cavendish in the Olden Time," by Walter Simpson; "Memories of the Past," by John P. Tanton; and "The Tenant League Proceedings," by John Ross. The poetry of the number consists of a rare sonnet, "Christmas," by the late Thomas LePage; "At The Dusk," a sonnet full of beauty and the love of nature, from the pen of Professor Cayen; and some fine verses by Miss May Carroll, whose admirers will enjoy reading her "Christmas Greetings."

In the field of fiction two writers have essayed. Mr. L. W. Watson pitifully and delightfully in "Retaliation" describes a historical fact that took place in Charlottetown when the present century was young. That this tale is cleverly written goes without saying, and it will be found to excel in interest. "The Phantom Bell Ringers" is a story of the Old St. James' Kirk, of Charlottetown, of which the author, Mr. J. Edward Rendle, dips into and evolves a startling tale out of a supernatural manifestation said to have actually occurred in the "auld kirk." "A Query," signed by "Topsy," is an earnest and thoughtful inquiry indicative of a mind that justly appreciates and values the blessedness of that Peace which the angels sang of in the fields of Palestine nineteen centuries ago. The leading articles of this number is from the pen of Senator Ferguson whose reputation as a popular writer led us to expect capable treatment of his subject, "Merrie Christmas,"—an expectation that personal of the article fully realizes. An article on "Nursing at Chickamauga Park" by Miss Florence Kelly, formerly of Summerside, throws light upon the trials and troubles of an Army Nurse's life.

The Magazine is profusely and tastefully illustrated with reproductions from photographs, etc. The cover is really beautiful, being a design by Mr. L. W. Watson in the centre of which is a reduced engraving of Murillo's Nativity.

SCHOONER A SHORE—The schooner Minnie A., Captain McLean, is reported to have gone ashore at Cariboo, during thick weather a few days ago. The Minnie A. loaded here with oats for Picton.

TAKEN TO HALIFAX—The body of the late Mr. P. P. Archibald was this morning taken to Halifax, where the interment will take place. Mr. Moffatt, of New Glasgow, a brother of Mrs. Archibald, accompanied the remains.

C. P. R. EXTENSION.—The Canadian Pacific Railway is applying to the City Council of Ottawa for permission to extend the railway through the city so as to connect the trans-continental line with the new short line between Montreal and Ottawa.

THE NORTHUMBERLAND—From now to the end of the season the Northumberland will arrive in Summerside about three hours earlier than usual. She will not wait at Point du Chene for the C. P. R. express, but will connect with the afternoon train from St. John. The night express to Charlottetown will consequently arrive earlier.

HORSES PURCHASED.—The Moncton Times reports that Mr. J. L. Cox, driver for A. B. Eter, Amberst, has returned from New York where he purchased for Mr. Eter, a stallion, son of Wilton. He also purchased for himself a mare by Actuary, which has a record of 2.11. Both horses are standard bred, but the stallion is without record.

CANADIAN EXHIBITS.—It is said that the number of exhibits from Canada at the Paris exposition will greatly exceed those sent to any previous exhibition, the world's fair not excepted, if the live stock exhibit is not counted. Up to the present time the total number of entries exceed 890, and by the time the books have closed it is fully expected there will be one thousand.

HAY FOR SOUTH AFRICA.—Hay to feed the British army horses in South Africa is being compressed at Atlantic dock, Brooklyn. It is put up in cylindrical form, 18 inches high and the same in diameter, and is pressed hard as a board. The bales weigh about 145 lbs. When fed the hay is in layers about 3/4 inch thick. The hay under this new process occupies about one-third of the space as before used.

FATAL FIRE.—A most appalling fire visited Reading, Pa., on Dec. 7th, when a hoisery mill took fire from an explosion of gasoline. It contained about 600 employes, mostly women and girls, who became panic-stricken and jumped continually from the first and second floor windows. Fifty-seven were injured, and two burned corpses were found in the ruins. The employees found it difficult to get out, and some say that the doors were locked.
