

St. Mary's In 3-1 Win Over Beavers In First Encounter At Halifax

HALIFAX, Oct. 18 (CP)—Halifax St. Mary's played a 4-11 home game tonight as they opened their Maritime Major Hockey League schedule on home ice with a 3-1 win over Saint John Beavers.

It was Beavers' first defeat in three starts and set them back into second place with Saints. Saints were outgunned in all three periods but cashed in on their opportunities to pull out the win.

They had only two shots on goal while the Beavers kept their defense tight. The Saints were playing two men short.

Saints' first line of Billy Watson, Don Lewis and Danny Wilkes carried the load for the locals, joining two of the goals and playing a tight two-way game. Lewis tied the first and Wilkes added the insurance marker in the third frame. Both goals came on slick three-man plays. Andy Brown whipped in the middle period goal in a play with Orville Kelly and Stan Wasecki.

Larry Frechette, fronted by a hard fighting defence and the persistent backchecking of the Halifax forwards, balked the Beavers time after time. Veteran Pete Leswick was all over the ice, harassing the Saint John forwards and breaking up plays. Back on the rearward, newcomer Danny Nixon and 20-year-old Mickle Keating were stalwarts.

Beavers applied pressure in the third after Kelly was chased for charging and was followed by Watson for high sticking. Tom Smelle skated across the net to convert Johnny Ubraco's pass for Beavers first and only goal of the game.

In the third period, Halifax

checked the Beavers closely and gave little chance to set up any dangerous plays. It was a long passing play that gave Halifax the insurance marker, Wilkes converting from Watson and Lewis near the halfway mark of the final session. Beavers scored a goal in the third but it was called back because the Saint John scorer had tallied on a high stick.

There was no heavy bumping in the game. Both teams presented fast, slick-passing lineups. Referees MacLean and Hefferling doled out 14 penalties, 13 of them for minor offences. The sentences were evenly divided but all Halifax goals were scored while the Beavers were at full strength.

Both played last night at Glace Bay.

Walter Pawlyshyn may also line up with the team. Pawlyshyn is expected in today from Providence where he has been undergoing treatment for a pulled back muscle.

Late last night Club officials still had not received word about the status of Bob Gray and Connie Bonhomme whose appeal to play with the Islanders has been before the C. A. H. A. for quite some time.

The Islanders will return here today by bus from a three day road trip to Cape Breton where they met the Millionaires and the Miners. This will be their third game in as many nights.

Forum Manager Bill Brown reported a big advance sale of holding tickets but stated that they were plenty good seats left. Another sellout crowd is expected to watch the two teams.

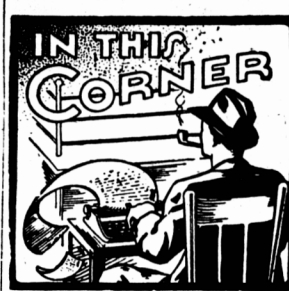
A winger, Bailey is coming to Miners on a 24-hour recall arrangement, Poile stated. He now is on the Cleveland list and on loan to Miners.

Sports Forum

Sir: I came away from Monday night's game at the Forum with a very disappointed feeling. I had hoped that after last year's fiasco with the Sydney team that our representatives in the Maritime Hockey League would put them away soundly tonight in the final game with the Sydney team and try to play straight hockey. I am sure that my sentiments are the same as those of hundreds of decent people in this City and Province. Instead of that we were, once again given the same dose of a performance that will eventually kill hockey in this City, in this section of Canada and, unless somebody "wises up", all over Canada.

Our Island reputation suffered throughout the Maritimes last year. You have no difficulty recognizing this if you visit other sections. Islanders are looked upon as roughnecks. You must admit that. I would not for one moment suggest that I am advocating a sissy game to be played. Hockey, properly played according to rules, is a rough game. Using butt ends, fists, savage checking into the boards, strenuous arguing with referees, and all the Hippodrome tactics seen all last season and again introduced Monday night have no place in a decent law-abiding place like we have here. Our children look up to these hockey players. They imitate them. If we look at them and really analyze their unsportsmanlike tactics and ask ourselves if we want our kids to do ANYTHING to win a game, what must our answer be? NO!

When we relied on our own boys to represent us we had good teams. Teams of whom we could be proud. We produced chaps like Bucko Trainor, Jackie Coyle, Buck Whiteleg, Bert Steele, Hickiey Nicholson, Johnny Squarebriggs, Teams like the Junior Royals, the Abegweit's, we were proud of them. They played CLEAN hockey, we are CLEAN PEOPLE and were once good sports. Spectacles such as are prevalent in our Forum belong in the days of the Roman Arenas. Monday night we saw two great goalies in action. Ours made one mistake. Theirs made one too. He went out of his net and was savagely checked. It looked as though the object was to "Get" him. That's gangsterism and if it is to become accepted practise then why misname hockey as "Sport".

We'd like to support a team. We'd like to win. But if we can't have a team that can win and lose in a decent fashion then let's send the team home and go back (or forward) to what we once were fond of, a game called "Hockey". We paid last summer to see fighters that didn't fight, why don't our hockey players try that?

There are many who feel as I do. I am Sir, etc., SPORT FAN.

Habs Score 3-2 Victory Over N. Y. Rangers

MONTREAL, Oct. 18 (CP)—Montreal Canadiens continued their hot pace in the National Hockey League tonight by edging New York Rangers 3-2 for their third win in the four games they have played to date. The log was the second in two engagements so far for the Rangers.

Canadiens set up a two-goal lead in the first period and New York cut the margin with the only goal of the middle frame. Both teams counted in the last period, Rangers' final goal coming after a series of desperate power plays and only eight seconds before the end of the game.

The game was a close-checking affair most of the way, and the New Yorkers were forced to open up and take chances late in the game. Fourteen penalties were called, including a major to defenceman Ross Lowe of Canadiens for fighting. He tangled with Zello Toppazzini, who drew a minor roughing penalty.

GLACE BAY, N. S., Oct. 18—(CP)—Glace Bay Miners played sharp two-way hockey tonight to mark up their second straight win in the Maritime Major Hockey League, a close 4-3 decision over Charlottetown Islanders.

Islanders, champions of the old Big Four, made a valiant attempt to gain their first win in three tries but lost it in the third when they were out-scored 2-1. Miners took a 2-0 lead in the first period but the champs from P.E.I. came back to knot the count in the second. The three goals of the final frame decided the game.

Two of those three goals came after a mid-ice free-for-all which saw four players chased to the penalty box, two of them with majors and two with minors. Johnny Dutchak of Islanders and Len Haley of Miners received majors as the featured batters.

The four penalties were handed out at 13:45. At 14:12 Islanders tied the score at 3-3 and 45 seconds later Miners shot the winning goal at 17:50 to make it 2-0 for Miners.
