Aberdeen University in Scotland from where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree in Agriculture. He is a District Commissioner of the Boy Scouts and the captain of his small-bore rifle team. Mr. MacKie's father was a former president of the Scottish Farmers Union and is now chairman of Governors of the North of Scotland College of Agriculture. Borden's Prosperous

Fluid milk and ice cream operations were satisfactory, but a fall in both export and domestic sales and prices of manufactured products cut net income of The Borden Company in Canada during 1948 to 15 cents last year. This is revealed by Theodore G. Montague, president of the parent company in his annual report to stockholders and employees, released today.

The Canadian Company, Mr. Montague said, is proceeding with a program of modernization involving substantial expenditures for new delivery and refrigerating equipment.

Sales of The Borden Company and its consolidated subsidiaries, including the Canadian firm, were \$613,763,267 last year, about 5.5 per cent less than the 1948 record of \$649,592,375. Over-all volume of goods sold was maintained and the reduction in dollar sales, he said, was the result of lower selling prices for the Company's principal products.

Net income from all Borden operations in Canada, the United States and abroad was \$21,890,479, the best in the company's history and was 14 per cent greater than the \$19,179,427 earned in 1948. Earnings were \$5.10 per share as compared with \$4.46 in the previous year. The rate of profit was 3.57 cents of the sales dollar as compared with 2.95 cents in 1948 and the 20 year average of 3.3 cents.

Dividend payments of \$11,593,320 were the highest in 18 years. Dividends in 1949 were \$2.70 per share as compared with \$2.55 the year before.

Current assets totaled \$142,036,191 and current liabilities \$35,382,297. Net working capital of \$106,653,894 was \$735,077 higher than in 1948 and was greater than at any previous year-end. Inventories in the close of 1949 were \$48,988,814, a decline of 15 per cent from \$57,638,783 at the end of 1948.

The capital expenditures program for 1950 is about \$15,600,000 and includes a new budget of \$11,600,000 combined with a carry-over of some \$4,000,000 from previous years. No new large construction projects are planned and the program consists mainly of motor vehicles and refrigerating equipment replacements. Depreciation accruals were \$9,661,874 in 1949 or \$3,590,508 less than the year's capital expenditures of \$13,252,380.

Address By Liberal Member For King's

The following excerpts are from an address from Parliament Hill, Ottawa by Mr. T. J. Kitchin, M.P. for King's.

"In this address my first words are to express to my friends in King's my sincere thanks for the measure of trust and confidence you have placed in me in honoring me by sending me to Ottawa to represent you. I assure you, the electors, that I shall do my utmost to fulfill your expectations and my duties as your representative.

"Some 95 new Members came to Ottawa for this twenty-first Parliament of Canada. I was deeply impressed with the friendly and courteous manner we new Members were received by the Senators and Senior Members, those who had been here in former Parliaments, and also by the members of the House of Commons' Staff. This friendly and courteous environment is of inestimable value to new Members.

"History has been made in the opening of this Parliament. "First: The Liberal Leader, the Honourable L. St. Laurent, has led the largest following to Parliament since Confederation.

"Secondly: We have for the first time the new Members of Newfoundland take their seats in this Parliament.

"Thirdly: We have the largest man and also the youngest Member who have ever taken their seats.

"During this session history is being made in the passing of the Bill abolishing appeals to the Privy Council in England, and also the Bill enabling Canada to amend its Constitution without recourse to the United Kingdom Parliament, in Federal matters.

"This Parliament has seen its twelfth Prime Minister since Confederation and of these twelve, four have been Liberals and eight Conservatives.

"It is significant to note that of the ten Provinces voting in the past June Election, eight of the ten gave our present leader a majority.

"Referring to the fundamental change in Canada's Constitution: The resolution moved by the Prime Minister - An Act to Amend the British North America Act, 1867, relating to the Amendment of the Constitution of Canada. This resolution deals with the attributes of Canada as an adult Sovereign State.

"Since Confederation in 1867, it has been found desirable to have amendments made to the British North America Act on eleven occasions. In only two cases were amendments sought after consultation with all the Provinces. The first was in 1907, when it was proposed to alter the basis of Provincial subsidies. All the Provinces were consulted and eight of the then nine Provinces agreed.

"The amendment, however, was dropped.

"In 1940 there was an application to transfer to Parliament the jurisdiction in respect to Unemployment Insurance. That amendment was sought after the consent of all Provincial Governments had been obtained, to analyze eleven cases.

"In nine, the Provinces were not consulted at all. In one case, some of the Provinces were consulted (those to be immediately affected by the Amendment). In the other case, all Provinces were consulted. In one case, eight of nine Provinces agreed. In the other, all Provinces agreed. Regardless of these facts, the official opposition moved a six months' hoist to the Bill, arguing that all the Provinces should first be consulted. I think the majority of Canadians will realize that the Government took the proper course in enacting this legislation."

A sensation in British political circles was created when Lord Beaverbrook's Conservative London Evening Standard called John Strachey (above), war minister, who controls the British secret service, an "avowed Communist."

The charge came as parliament was preparing to investigate the case of Dr. Klaus Fuchs, German-born British atomic scientist sentenced to 14 years in jail for espionage on behalf of Soviet Russia. The Standard condemned Strachey at a moment when additional spy arrests were expected as a result of information given by Fuchs. In replying to the charge, minister dismissed his early espousal of Communist philosophy as the follies of youth and denied that he had ever been a member of Red party.

Launderette And Diaper Service Opens Wednesday

A unique service for mothers is being opened this week by two Charlottetown brothers, William and Louis Howatt, Jr., who will begin operating their Launderette and Diaper Service at 176 Kent Street on Wednesday, March 15th.

These two local boys have taken the idea from a service offered by larger Canadian centres where many housewives are without facilities to do their family wash. Customers are invited to take in their soiled laundry, drop it into one of the Thor automatic machines, and sit down to knit or read while their laundry is washed, rinsed and semi-dried.

Those who prefer not to wait may have one of the staff look after their wash for them, picking it up later at their convenience, when it will be ready for ironing.

Another feature of this new business is the diaper service. The Launderette and Diaper Service will supply diapers for the new baby, bring the customer fresh once a week, and pick up the soiled.

Approved by the Department of Public Health, this new service for busy housewives is a boon in this age when every hour spent over the laundry tub is time lost from pleasant associations with friends, and relaxation with the children.

Will Give Travelogue On Switzerland
