The winners led a group of 26 students representing high schools from across the Island in a set of day-long competitive examinations held at SDU last weekend.

First place winner Ian Gorman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Gorman. He attended St. Dunstan's High School for the past two years, standing fourth in grade 11 and third in grade 12.

Second place winner Linda Green is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Green. She stood consistently near the top in her years of elementary schooling at Cardigan North School. Since entering Montague Regional High School, Linda placed fourth in grade 11 and second this year in grade 12.

She won the prize for French for two consecutive years, in grades 10 and 11, and this year was awarded the alumni association prize for the student who best exemplified the quality of scholarship.

Linda served on the yearbook staff at Montague High School and claims that reading is probably her top extra-curricular activity.

She plans to follow a bachelor of arts program at SDU with a view to a future in teaching.

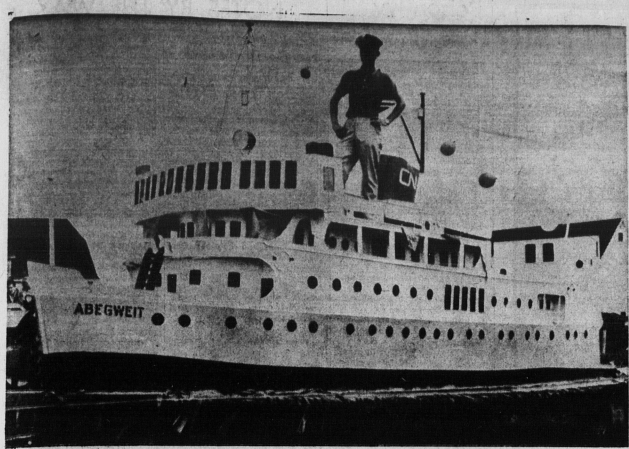

Phenomena Of Can., Pierre Berton Are Seen

Canada consists physically of a rather large tract of land, most of which is distinguished by the fact that few Canadians have ever been there.

Pierre Berton, having to start the recounting of "Adventures on the Great Northwest" a day late, made up as quickly as possible in the next night in attempting to instill in his audience a sense of flavor of tundra and pines last night. The program could be called a "get to know your country better" traveling with Adventure Pierre helping out. Or it could be called a "get to know your Berton better" monologue with films and stories of the North providing a rich background. Whichever way it was taken

by different people, the program proved interesting, colorful, and enjoyable.

Things got underway with an introduction by artistic director Mavor Moore. Then the several-hundred strong audience, including the Premier and Mrs. Shaw, settled back to watch the first of two films, City of Gold, narrated by Mr. Berton himself which was made seven years ago.

17 AWARDS

The film, which has appeared on the CBC networks, is about Dawson City, Pierre Berton's home town, during the days of the gold rush. It has won a total of 17 international awards for its makers, the animation department of the National Film Board.

The stage was set for explorer-writer-TV personality ex-ecutive Pierre Berton himself. For an unascertainable but quickly-moving period of time this large man talked of the North—what it is like, what was like; and of its bigger-than-life people, ways, and traditions.

He talked of his own experiences in the North—living there, flying with its greatest bush pilot, Russ Baker, to its extraordinary Mackenzie. He talked of the Mackenzie, the Nahanni, sled must ox, the winter, the unexpected hot springs.

TALES OF BERTON

Perhaps only the grandiose Berton, a product of this wild land, could have talked about it in all its grandeur and kept the audience spellbound with tales of humor and charm and adventure.

The Berton wit was there to the end.

And then it was time for Nabhan, a story in color film by the best documentary-makers in the world, the NFB, about the man who led the North and its elusive gold. The old man and the magnificence of the great North were both beautifully depicted.

The program came to an end and an audience, exclaiming happily, rose to go, perhaps having learned a little about the phenomenon of Canada—and the phenomenon of Berton.
