

Involvement With Girl 14 Lands Man Six-Month Term

SUMMERSIDE — A Springside West man, Sherey Everett Waite, was sentenced to six months in Prince County Jail yesterday morning when he pleaded guilty to a charge of unlawfully having sexual relations with a girl under the age of 14, before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County court.

The accused had originally pleaded not guilty but changed his plea yesterday. He was represented by G. Bruce MacDonald, Crown Prosecutor, and George R. McMahon.

John Henry Bernard of Lennox Island pleaded guilty to driving without a license and was fined \$10 and costs or five days.

Another Lennox Island resident, Lawrence Raymond MacLennan, was also fined \$10 and costs or five days for allowing a person not the owner of a license to drive his vehicle.

An Urbanville man, Mark Joseph Gallant, entered no plea when he appeared on a charge of driving without due care and attention and his case was adjourned to July 29.

Appearing on two charges, Warren Andrew Chappell, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for driving a vehicle not properly equipped and on a similar charge for speeding.

Charged with impaired driving, an airman from RCAF station Summerside, Clifford Joseph LeClair, was fined \$75 and costs or 15 days.

Wesley Wesley Heffell of Summerside, RR 3, was fined \$10 and costs for driving an unregistered vehicle a go-kart which was improperly equipped, on the highway.

A St. Christopher man, Joseph Denis Arsenault, was fined \$10 and costs or five days for passing a vehicle on a solid side line.

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Brig. Suttie said some units are efficient, mainly because of the interest taken by their commanding officers. But the public was not receiving full value for the \$38,000,000 annual cost of the militia. Some units which were basically ineffective were still being maintained.

In some areas, there were too many units competing for too few recruits. Officer and non-commissioned officer strength in many units was at 80 per cent of requirement but the number of private stood at about 20 per cent.

The turnover in the militia was high because there was little to attract a recruit or sustain his interest if he did join.

Viet Nam, de Gaulle said, and there should be no preliminary conditions in the conference.

DETERMINATION NEEDED

For such a meeting to succeed, he stressed, France, China, the Soviet Union and the United States must be really determined to cease all intervention.

He said there must then be massive economic and technical aid to all the Indochina countries.

Turning to Europe, de Gaulle called for it to run its own affairs, but added that it was still necessary to conserve the alliance with the U.S. "because it is in the interests of both sides of the Atlantic while the Soviet threat exists."

De Gaulle said circumstances had changed since the immediate post-war period when the United States directly or indirectly managed the affairs of the "New Europe has emerged as an entity capable of living on its own."

But he accused the West Germans of dragging their feet over the making of an independent "European" Europe.

"The fact is the federal government of Germany does not yet believe that Europe's policy should be European and independent," he said.

Discussing France's atomic power, de Gaulle said that "in six years time France's dissuasive power will exceed 2,000 Hiroshima bombs."
