200 Seeking Missing Youth

GLOVERTOWN, Nfld. (CP)—Nearly 200 men will continue their search today for a 15-year-old missing youth who was last seen in the woods by his home Saturday.

The search party swept into the woods to pick blueberries. RCMP and militia searchers combed the area and flew over it in a light plane Sunday.

There was no sign of the boy. An RCMP dog was not brought in as soon as the weather conditions permit. Heavy rain and high winds which pounded Newfoundland Monday hampered search operations.

Little New In Picture At Ottawa

OTTAWA (CP)—MPs returned to work Monday after a two-month Commons recess. Some taxpayers may feel the MP's return is a relief.

First item of legislation dealt with was a maximum \$30 annual increase in personal income tax to help support a \$10-million increase in 1975 in old age pensions.

Apart from that and a question over the revised Social Credit members and breakaway Tories, was business as usual.

There were oral questions on such matters as the proposed Great Lakes labor strike, the Columbus River treaty, supply of fuel for eastern farmers, branch line abandonments, the Prairie and Alberta malfeasance case at Winnipeg, the civil service and jurisdiction over the Eskimos of northern Ontario.

Some former subjects of port airarmy were handed over to the military.

Income Tax Boost to Provide for Old Age Pension Increase

OTTAWA (CP)—A \$100-million boost in old age pensions will be implemented before the end of the year.

Parliament N-Powered Satellite Is Orbiting

OTTAWA (CP)—The first U.S. satellite powered only by a nuclear generator—prototype of a system needed for space exploration—is in orbit and sending radio signals back to earth, the Atomic Energy Commission said Monday.

The satellite, launched Saturday from Vandenberg Air Force Base, Calif., carries a nuclear power system called SNAP-5A. The initial start for the satellite was made by the Atomic Energy Commission.

The "A-5" means it is a prototype of the next series of models built to supply nuclear power to space vehicles.

The satellite carried instruments in addition to radio gear was not disclosed.

Air Force Major R. Carpenter, SNAP project engineer, said a press statement generator was designed to operate for 100 days.

Frozen Foods Find U.K. Outlet

A new market for frozen food products from Prince Edward Island is apparently being developed in the United Kingdom. Officials of two of the major food plants at Charlottetown, which are currently operating in the province are hopeful that a regular shipping service will be established.

The ocean freighter, Coda Scotia, is due to sail from St. John's this morning with more than 100 tons of frozen food products in refrigerated containers.

The bulk of the cargo comes from the Seaman Bros. (Canada) Ltd. plant at New Annapolis, and consists of french fries, potatoes, peas and broccolis. All will remain frozen until sold on the British market.

Also part of the cargo is a long ton of cauliflower being shipped by the P.E.I. Foods plant at Charlottetown. This is part of a trial order for the British for 800 long tons of cauliflower being filled by Maritime food processors in this fall.

SPICE LOADING

The loading of this ship which was completed yesterday for the last six days of the second such loading of frozen food from the Island this year. A vessel will be loaded of Charlottetown with frozen peas for Britain.

It is believed that a third shipment will be made in the next month.
