He was rescued by Mr. Harold Bryant and Fred Arsenault, who were working nearby and heard his cries for help and those of his playmates. The two men crawled out on the ice and dragged the youngster from the water which is said to be about eight feet deep at this point.

What could have been a fatal accident occurred yesterday morning at Unionville, near O'Leary, when five-year-old Nancy Adams, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Amos Adams, was struck by a light truck.

The accident occurred on the pavement near her home. Mr. Robert Campbell, Alberton, driver of the truck struck the vehicle over the road in an attempt to avoid striking the child, who was apparently walking well out on the centre of the road.

The truck was knocked unconscious when the truck went into the ditch and turned over but was removed from the vehicle by a passenger, Ernest MacMillan and recovered five minutes later.

A doctor was summoned to attend to the little girl, who made her own way home, and she was found to be suffering from scratches and bruises on her face where she was in collision with the truck.

Damage to the truck was not extensive.
