Misinterpretation Claimed In Smoking-Cancer Remarks

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—A member of the U.S. surgeon-general's advisory committee, who earlier spoke of a breakthrough in research on cigarette smoking and lung cancer, said his remarks were misinterpreted.
Dr. Charles A. LeMaistre, University of Texas vice-chancellor for health affairs, told an organizational meeting for the Texas Interagency Council on Smoking and Health Thursday that a Texas scientist has isolated a major cancer-causing element in cigarette smoke.
And "once an element is isolated, there is no problem eliminating it," he said.
He did not know reporters were present and moments later, when he learned of their presence, he sought to depreciate his remark.

Formosa Said Crux Of U.S., China Rift

TORONTO (CP)—Han Suyin, Chinese-born doctor and author, said here the United States must recognize that Formosa is part of China, and that there is a rift between the two countries can be healed.
"The recognition of... one China, is the fundamental obstacle holding back relations between the two countries, she said at a press conference. Until this is removed "it will be impossible to get anywhere."
Dr. Suyin, who says emphatically she is not a Communist but a Catholic ("My books are considered bourgeois") answered questions after her arrival for a weekend teach-in on China, sponsored by the University of Toronto.

A questioner said reports in North America have told of violent demonstrations among the Red Guards—book-burnings and Chinese youth running amok.
"Are you the Watts riots?" Dr. Suyin asked.
Answering another question, she said Communist China believes it should have a seat at the United Nations. "But it will not beg for it."
The teach-in brings together scholars and Far Eastern experts for what is thought to be one of the first large free-wheeling discussions in North America of present-day China and its government.

Among those speaking will be Dr. Suyin; Lord Lindsay of Birker; Harendra Mukerjee, Indian Communist party leader; Shinkichi Eto of the University of Tokyo and Chester Ronning, Canadian peace envoy to Viet Nam.

Soviet Officials Hold Yanks For Hotel Theft Of Statue

MOSCOW (AP)— Soviet authorities are holding two young Americans in solitary confinement on charges of stealing a statue of a bear from a Leningrad hotel, the U.S. embassy said.
The embassy identified the youths as Buel Wortham, Jr., 25, of North Little Rock, Ark., and Gerald M. Gilmour Jr., 24, of Montclair, N.J.
Conviction carries punishment of up to six years' deprivation of liberty.
There was no immediate indication how long the investigation would last or whether it would end with the Americans being put on trial.
In Washington, Robert J. McCloskey, state department press officer, said the Soviet foreign ministry had been asked for "a speedy resolution of the case, rather than permitting what appears to be a prank and not a serious crime to grow into an international incident."
An embassy consular officer who visited Wortham and Gilmour Tuesday said they were well but he found their conditions of confinement trying.
Wortham and Gilmour were arrested Oct. 1 at the Finnish border as they were driving out of the Soviet Union, the embassy said.
The antique statue of a bear "was allegedly discovered in their effects during customs examination," the embassy said.
Information about the statue, including its value, was not available.
BAN DOMESTIC DISPUTES
CAPE TOWN (Reuters)—Labor Minister Marais Viljoen introduced in the South African Parliament Saturday a bill aimed at prohibiting strikes which do not arise from employer-workers relations. The minister said the government is perturbed about recent strikes which resulted from domestic disputes of a union.
