AN ISLAND WOMAN BURNED.—A despatch to the Boston Globe, dated Providence, R. I., July 29, says: "Rose Donnelly, aged 89 years, was burned to death at Cole's Hotel in Warren, last night. She had just retired and the door was locked and the room full of flames. The fire was discovered by Quincy Tucker, a guest, and the alarm saved the biggest and best hotel in Bristol county from destruction. The body was very severely burned, and all hope of saving life was given up as soon as the doctors viewed the injuries. Mrs. Donnelly overturned the kerosene lamp which was used in her room. Her clothing was about burned off, and from the position in which her body was found she must have thrown herself over the bed while wrapped in the flames. Mrs. Donnelly came to Warren from Prince Edward Island nine years ago."

THE PREMIER REPUDIATES

Charge of Unfriendliness TO THE UNITED STATES.

OTTAWA, Aug. 2. Premier Abbott has just returned from New Brunswick. In an interview held yesterday he said: "It has surprised me not a little to observe the general acceptance which many of our Canadian newspapers accord to the United States contention that the 'Dominion has been instant and constant in hostility to her neighbor.' Now, I am not aware that Canada has ever manifested a quarrelsome disposition in her dealings with the United States. Speaking particularly of our international relations since I have had anything to do with the Government, I am sure that our bearing towards the people of the south of us has been most conciliatory. Three times in the past year have we sent delegations to Washington to clear up this very question of canal tolls, and as for our recent legislation, it has all been in a direction of furthering friendly intercourse. All through, there has been nothing, even in our legislation upon international subjects, to justify the accusation of unfriendliness which the press of the United States charge upon us, and which I am sorry a section of our Canadian press so readily acquiesces."

Laurier and Mowat

The Little Premier's Pretensions Ridiculed.

MONTREAL, Aug. 2. Laurier evidently intends to stamp out once and for all, any attempt to boom Mr. Mowat for the leadership of the Grit party. Le Canadian, Laurier's pocket organ, ridicules the idea of bringing the little premier to the front, and declares flatly that the Grit party would not follow him. In fact the paper denies that Mr. Mowat is in touch with the majority of the Grit party.

A TERRIBLE AFFAIR.

Policeman Shot Dead

MONCTON, Aug. 2. While the police were attempting to arrest two supposed burglars in a house of ill-repute kept by Mrs. Donnelly on Vulcan Street, policeman J. E. Sedman was shot dead. The man who did the shooting has been arrested.

PITTSBURG, Aug. 2. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of Col. Hawkins and Lt.-Col. Strocker, of the Tenth Regiment, on a charge of aggravated assault upon private Iams.

LONDON, Aug. 2. A petition has been filed against the return of Hon. Mr. Balfour as M. P. for the east division of Manchester, on the ground of bribery.

General Telegraphic News.

MONTREAL, July 31.—The Allan steamer Newfoundland sailed at daybreak with goods valued at \$25,000 for the St. John's sufferers. Some \$5,000 will be sent in cash, in addition to the \$5,000 cabled some weeks ago.

SIMLA, July 30.—The Hazaras, who are in revolt against the Ameer of Afghanistan, have been joined by the great Bezud tribe, and the combined forces have blocked the road between Herat and Cabul. Five hundred British troops, with two guns, have been ordered to occupy the Gomal pass in the mountains between Afghanistan and India.

WINNIPEG, July 30.—A magnificent crop for Manitoba is well nigh assured. The warm weather and occasional showers of the last few weeks have rapidly advanced for grain, and harvesting will begin about the middle of August.

WINNIPEG, July 30.—Three to one represents the vote in favor of prohibition submitted to plebiscite in last election. George Lawrence, the defeated candidate in Killarney, is being prosecuted by the temperance people for treating during his canvass.

OTTAWA, July 31.—At a meeting of the council on Saturday, on the recommendation of the Minister of Agriculture, the government decided to ask for tenders for the extension of the wharf at Grand Isle to deep water, and also for a new wharf at Albert Head, British Columbia, to which large steamers may be removed for disinfection. It is understood that guarantees will be fitted with the most approved modern appliances for the protection of the public health from the spread of disease on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts.

LONDON, July 30.—Hon. Edward Blake has reached London in excellent health, and awaits with pleasure the work of the Imperial Parliament. He will make his first speech in England on Thursday, on invitation of the "Eighty club." He will also address the home rule union on Monday, dealing especially with the good effects of home rule in Canada.

TORONTO, July 31.—W. H. Allison, formerly M. P. for Hants, N. S., at present located in Deloraine, Man., and a staunch Methodist, has two column letter in the Empire of Saturday defending Sir John Thompson, his old friend and colleague in the Nova Scotia legislature, against the violent attacks of Dr. Douglas and the Montreal Witness.
