TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Resisting the Law! A DEFIANT SKIPPER. LOUISBURG, C. B., Aug. 3. The schr. Ada Ann, Capt. Perry, was seized here at daylight this morning by preventive officer Townsend, for having on board a quantity of contraband goods, chiefly tobacco and liquors. As the preventive officer got on board, Capt. Perry ordered the anchor to be hoisted and the vessel was got under way, but owing to its being calm at the time she made little or no headway. He then put out a boat to tow his vessel, but in the meantime boats from the shore with customs officers on board surrounded the vessel. As the Captain refused to give her up the officers opened the hatches and took out some of the contraband goods, but as the schooner was proceeding out of the harbor at the time only a part was captured. The broad arrow was put on the vessel, but as the Captain defied the officers to take charge, the vessel escaped; she will be seized at the first port she enters and the Captain will be arrested on criminal charges.
