Newsman Hear New Details Of New Shootings Great Power of Nuclear Bomb Are Reported In Gaza Strip

ABOARD USS MT. MCKINLEY, Bikini Atoll (AP)—A nuclear bomb exploded at ground level could shade a city to pieces with its earthquake-like concussion. This was one of the new details of the tremendous power of the H-bomb made known to newspapermen Sunday after bad weather forced postponement of a massive hydrogen blast scheduled for Tuesday.

But reporters, invited to the mid-Pacific proving ground to witness the scheduled test shot of an air-dropped H-weapon and inspect the area, learned some of the things the scientists have discovered about this little-discussed matter.

Detonation of an H-bomb at ground level produces a special effect which virtually makes it a new weapon—a sort of Q-bomb for creating an earthquake. The reporters and civil defence observers saw some examples of what a surface detonation can do. They looked down from a plane into the mighty crater ripped out by the big 1954 H-bomb explosion.

Until now, little has been said about the earthquake-like effect of the nuclear bomb, which also destroys and kills by blast, heat flash, instantaneous radiation and the slow poison of radioactive contamination.

Indigo blue water filled a two-mile-wide cavity where an island of the Bikini atoll once stood. Crushed coral and sand were piled in mounds along the lagoon side of the crater, thrown out by the mighty blast.

The Israeli account said a group of Israeli farm workers was attacked by Egyptian soldiers near the Nirim settlement. Nirim is about seven miles south of Khan Yunis. Egyptian troops penetrated 200 yards into Israeli territory, but withdrew when an Israeli patrol arrived.

Critical Speech Before Psychiatric Association

"The task of psychiatrists, it seems to me, is to get back in the asylums and laboratories, which they are so proud to have left, and prove, by established criteria, that their concepts have scientific validity."

Dr. Percival Bailey, director of the Illinois State Psychiatric Institute of Chicago, lashed out at many modern techniques for treating mental states as dangerous or ineffectual.

"APPALLED" BY LOBOTOMY He had been "frankly appalled" by the results of lobotomy—a surgical procedure for treating certain mental conditions by severing nerve pathways to a frontal lobe of the brain.

The soul of His servant, Margaret Mary O'Regan, wife of Pius McGaughey, Green Road, Prince Edward Island, entered into her life of glory on March 23rd, 1956. Her death occurred at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Gerald Mitchell, Charlottetown.

Mrs. McGaughey enjoyed excellent health and maintained a very active life until she was stricken a few months prior to her death. She entered the Charlotte-town Hospital in late October, where, upon extensive medical examination, her condition was diagnosed unusual and very serious. Upon the recommendation of her physician, she proceeded to Boston's famed Lahey Clinic, for advice and possible remedial treatment by specialists.

strength fortified by the rites of the Catholic Church, of which she was a devout member. Her death, though not unexpected, came as a great shock to her husband and family, who were her constant companions during her illness.

Born at Aughville, County Cork, Ireland, she was the eldest daughter of Mary Brennan and the late Morgan O'Regan. After graduating from Drumore National High School, she immigrated to the U.S.A., where she joined relatives in Massachusetts and was employed consecutively in Boston, Marlborough and Lynn, returning to her home in Ireland, once for an extended visit. During her residence in Lynn, she was an active member of the Young Ladies' Sodality, St. Mary's Church, and also became a promoter for St. Joseph's Union, N. Y., a Catholic Society devoted to the temporal and spiritual care of homeless children. In which capacity she continued until her death.

In 1916 she was married at St. John's Church, Quincy, Mass., and shortly thereafter moved to Green Road, P.E.I., where she resided with her husband until the onset of her illness. Being of a happy and cheerful disposition and a gracious hostess, she made many friends in her new home and country. She displayed a keen interest in its schools and educational system, and in affairs of the nation. She was later, on varying occasions, to travel in five of the provinces. She was an example of Christian motherhood who devoted her life to her home, her family and her church. By her good works and charitable attributes she showed a zeal for the spiritual welfare of others. Because of her ability and willingness to help, she was often called upon by her pastors to perform special duties, to

which she applied herself diligently. For a number of years prior to the building of a mission church in the community, the living room of her home was converted monthly into a chapel, where the priest offered Mass and Communion for everyone, but chiefly for the benefit of the elderly and children of the area. She loved this work and looked upon it as a special privilege. She also served for a time as a Sunday School teacher, and was formerly a member of the C.W.L. At social functions of the church, she was always present with a generous helping hand and will be greatly missed by her fellow workers. In her hobbies these aesthetic characteristics were expressed in her beautiful flower gardens, and in the various forms of needle work at which she excelled.

Besides her sorrowing husband, Pius McGaughey, she leaves to mourn her loss, her mother, Mrs. Mary O'Regan, Cork, Ireland, two daughters, Mary Don McAllister, Grand Falls, N. B., Julia, Mrs. Gerald Mitchell, Charlottetown, and eleven grandchildren. Five brothers also survive. Morgan and John, Quincy, Mass., who attended her funeral, Patrick, Jerry and Timothy in Ireland, three sisters, Hanna, Mrs. P. H. O'Leary and May, Mrs. C. O'Shea, Quincy, Mass., and Ellen, Mrs. Hurley, Cork City, Ireland. Four sisters and two brothers predeceased her.

The funeral was held from the Charlottetown Funeral Home on Monday morning, March 26th, to St. Dunstan's Basilica where Requiem High Mass was celebrated by Rev. Clarence Roche, who also officiated at the grave. Rev. James Smith, Kelly's Cross, her pastor, was present in the sanctuary. Two grandsons, Morgan and Gerald Mitchell were among the servers at the Mass.
