A MEETING of the Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon to take into consideration the securing of a hospital for contagious diseases. The different members of the Board dwell upon the need of a hospital for infectious diseases. It was suggested that the city secure a site in an isolated place for the construction of a hospital, just beyond the Driving Park the building to cost \$1,000. In the mean time a committee consisting of Dr. Johnson, S. W. Crabbe and Dr. Kelly were appointed to locate a temporary building and to look into a permanent location for the erection of a hospital if the Board should decide upon such a course.

On Wednesday evening last the Harvest Thanksgiving Service was held in St. Mark's Church, Kensington. The decorations were very pretty. Flowers, Ferns, and Autumn leaves, entwined themselves through the chancel, while a large display of fruit and vegetables of all kinds showed to great advantage in the various windows of the church. The pulpit and reading desk were very artistic. The harvest hymns were heartily sung by the choir, under the direction of the organist Miss Laura Walker. No 365 A. M. was sung as the collection hymn, Mrs. Winfield taking the solo parts. Mr. Winfield the minister in charge preached an eloquent and forcible sermon from the last verse of the 8th chapter of Gene 1. The collection was sent to the Board of Foreign Missions, and the vegetables and fruit to the P. E. I. Hospital.

The operating room of the P. E. Island Hospital has received a renovation that is thoroughly in accord with the unflagging zeal of its promoters. The ceiling and walls have been beautifully enamelled in blue and the woodwork painted in pure white. The expense of the renovation has been defrayed by Mr. G. F. Beer formerly of this city and now of Rossland, B. C., the money being remitted through Miss Isabel Macmillan of Summerside. It is indeed gratifying to know that at the present time this province is the possessor of possibly the finest operating room in the Maritime Provinces. It is understood that the surgical staff is well pleased with the room in general. For the information of the public we may state that the operating room on the second floor, is lighted with plate glass sky lights, and windows make it especially adapted for this purpose. The floor is of concrete, and the operating room tables and instrument cases are all of glass.

YESTERDAY evening the GUARDIAN representative waited upon a prominent member of the Charlottetown Light and Power company in reference to the increased rates. The gentleman talked with stated that, owing to the delay in having papers completed for the purchase of the plant from the Royal Company, the amalgamated companies have been unable to appoint a Board of Directors having had to adjourn their meeting on different occasions pending the completion of the papers. Thus it will be seen that the company is without a board. Now that the transfer has been completed, a first meeting of the Board of Directors will be held on Monday next, after which any irregularities in the application of the new rates will be considered. It was inevitable that in treating with some 1,000 people, that some irregularities would creep in, but in even the new tariff rates, the prices charged will be much below for the same light as in other cities. The gentleman talked with stated that it is also the intention of the company to improve the light.
