Scientific Use Of Winds Cuts Flying Time

MONTREAL, (CP)—Times have changed but the pilots of today's giant aircraft have one thing in common with masters of the old sailing ships. They still rely on the elements to speed their journeys.

In the past sailing vessels were powerless without a wind and today aircraft require a tail wind to reach their destinations in fast time.

Because of this an aerial detective hunt has been under way for some years to chart upper air currents daily so planes can sweep more quickly from one part of the world to the other.

This method of flying to a pressure pattern is paying off too. On shorter routes such as the Gander, Nfld., to Prestwick, Scotland, flight scientific use of high winds has cut the duration of an average trip by 20 to 30 minutes.

In fuel costs—an aircraft consumes 1,700 pounds of fuel an hour—the reduction means a potential saving of about 750 pounds of fuel. This has given commercial companies the opportunity to reduce fuel weight and carry more passengers without endangering their safety.

Work Of Canadians The theory of pattern flying was brought to a practical level six years ago, largely through the work of two Canadians, Ron Peel and Pete Powell, members of Trans-Canada Air Lines, and two of the world's leading navigators.

The routine today is this: Meteorologists draw an upper air chart showing the air flow at high altitudes. Navigators combine this daily report with up-to-date information they receive in flight to reach their destinations in the shortest possible time.

Meteorologists now are searching for another hidden treasure of the atmosphere. They hope soon to be able to chart the "jet stream," considered the ultimate in pressure pattern flight.

A TCA expert described the stream as a narrow band of air moving at high speeds in the upper atmosphere. If harnessed, it would enable long-distance flight times to be cut still further.

This jet stream is considered so powerful by air operators that they think it possible the stream was responsible for carrying smoke from Alberta forest fires across the Atlantic to cause a "blue moon" in the British Isles, some years ago.

Hoot Mon! It's A Great Life This Retirement

SYDNEY, N.S. (CP)—They say if you put a Scotsman on pension he'll live forever. Bolstering this adage are 15 ex-miners, mostly of Scottish descent, on the pension rolls of the Dominion Steel and Coal Company here.

All are over 90 years old, and all plan to enjoy retirement for years to come.

Nobody can say they didn't earn it. They are some of the men who started in the pits at 11 or 12 years of age, back in the days before child labor laws and trade unions. They earned up to 50 cents a day.

Once the hardy descendants of crusty old Scots found they had a pay proposition, they stuck to it. Some worked in the same mine-shaft for more than 50 years—watching mine owners come and go.

At least two of the oldsters are sharing retirement with their sons. Allan MacDonald, 97, began his working life when he was 12 years old, holding a miner's lamp for his big brother for 35 cents a day. He served for 66 years. His son, Joseph, 66, retired recently as shot-firer after 50 years' service. Michael MacNeil retired in 1947 after 65 years' service. A year later his son, Stephen, began to draw pension after 41 years in the pits.

These four between them account for nearly 2½ centuries of coal mining.

Atomic Cannon Being Tested In The Arctic

PORT CHURCHILL, Man. (CP) An atomic cannon is being tested under Arctic conditions at this military base near the Hudson bay port of Churchill but the Canadian Army said Wednesday the tests do not involve the firing of atomic warheads.

The presence of an atomic cannon in Canada's north became known following a tour of Port Churchill by 26 military attaches and advisers.

A release issued by army public relations said a 280-millimetre atomic cannon was included in a display at the armed forces Arctic centre here.

"The 280-millimetre rifle, which also fires the conventional type shell, has been undergoing cold weather tests here under the direction of United States authorities," the release added.

The release did not elaborate on the tests being carried out but an army spokesman in Winnipeg said only conventional type shells were being used.

Retired Professor Dies At Moncton

SASKATOON, (CP)—Word was received here of the death Wednesday at Moncton, N. B., of Dr. Stewart Basterfield, dean emeritus of Regina College and former professor of chemistry at the University of Saskatchewan.

Dr. Basterfield, 70, was stricken with a heart attack during a speaking tour and died in a Moncton hospital.

He joined the university faculty in 1913 as instructor in chemistry and was professor of the department from 1920 to 1940, when he was appointed dean of Regina college. He retired in 1950.

He is survived by his widow in Port Nelson, Ont., and two daughters, Mrs. D. R. Sherk of Toronto and Elizabeth of London, Ont.

"MOST WANTED" CAPTURED

CHICAGO — (AP) — Frankie James Wilson, 52-year-old former convict and one of the FBI's 10 most wanted fugitives, was seized by federal agents Monday. Wilson offered no resistance as four agents arrested him in a hotel. He was wanted for jumping a \$30,000 bond in Chicago in 1951 after he was named as one of four bandits who attempted to rob the home of Mrs. Violet Bidwell Wolferner, owner of the Chicago Cardinals football team.
