Opening lead—eight of spades. The declarer's first concern is to make his contract. In the same vein, the defenders' first concern is to defeat the contract. The hand we're dealing with contains a problem in defense, faced by East, which illustrates the underlying philosophy. He wins the first two tricks with the A-K of spades and the question is what he should do next. A great many players would undoubtedly return the ten of hearts. It is not difficult to find the reason why the heart return is made. To lead a diamond or a club into dummy's powerful minor suit holdings makes no sense and offers no future. A spade lead is out of the question because it has been dined.

Into all of us that you must not give declarer a ruff and discard. Hence, the trump return, by the process of elimination, seems to be the only rational return to make. But this line of reasoning has a fallacy. What it overlooks is that the trump return does nothing to further the defeat of the contract, while the spade return offers a genuine chance to defeat declarer. In effect, a trump return can be justified only by taking the view that the contract will be defeated because partner has two natural trump tricks. This is far too optimistic a view for East to take. While East is entitled to nurture the hope that this is the case, he should at the same time take steps to develop a trump winner for West which may not exist naturally. East reasons that West must have one trump trick, otherwise the cause is completely hopeless. By continuing spades at trick three, he hopes to promote a second trump trick for West. As the cards lie, the plan succeeds. If South ruffs the spade with the jack, West discards, and later makes both the king and nine of hearts. If South plays anything else at trick three, West is equally certain to score two trump tricks and bring about declarer's defeat.

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Prison Term Has No Terror For This Canadian Mother

 Canadian Press Staff Writer LONDON (CP) — Mrs. David Slater, 24-year-old Canadian mother, is prepared to spend two weeks in prison so she can continue fighting for nuclear disarmament in Britain. But police today appeared in no hurry to put her behind bars. Her alternative to a jail sentence would be to agree to keep the peace for a year. Mrs. Slater, a native of Brandon, Man., won't do that. "I don't want to be tied down for a year," she said in an interview. "I will go to prison. And I'm not dreading it in the least." Mrs. Slater was one of 47 members of the Direct Action Committee Against Nuclear Warfare arrested for obstructing police at a Norfolk rocket site Dec. 20. Another was Winnipeg-born Tom Waldon. **MOST REFUSE** When the demonstrators appeared in magistrate's court in Swaffham, Norfolk, Dec. 29, they were ordered to give recognizance to keep the peace for a year. Thirty-seven, including the two Canadians, refused. The court gave them a week to change their minds. But police showed no signs of starting their roundup when the time limit expired today. Mrs. Slater talked to a reporter as she prepared a meal for her husband and two children in their modest apartment in East London. "If I don't go to jail it will mean I will be tied down for a year, and I don't want that." Slater, 26, a mathematics student at a London University, supports his wife's stand completely. **NO MILITARY WORK** He once worked for six months with Avro (Canada) Ltd., on the new Arrow jet fighter but he "never again" will work on military projects. Friends will care for Susan, 3, and Peter, 2, if and when their mother goes to jail. "They will be well looked after," she said. Slater says the specific objective of the Direct Action Committee is to have Britain halt construction of nuclear bases. The over-all objective is universal disarmament. "The question of these bases being a deterrent does not enter the picture," he said. "These bases only invite destruction." He also said it is "ridiculous" to think the alternative to the bases would be Russian domination. "And even with Russian occupation" Mrs. Slater said, "we would at least be alive."
