N. S. Legislature Is Prorogued
Canadian Press Staff Writer HALIFAX (CP) — Lieutenant-Governor Alistair Fraser prorogued the Nova Scotia legislature Friday night, ending a 6½-week session, the first under a Conservative government since 1933.

The governor drove through downtown streets crowded with Friday night shoppers to historic Province House, where he assented to 120 bills enacted since the house opened Feb. 27.

The legislation provides for: 1. A new five-year tax-rental agreement with Ottawa for which Nova Scotia receives \$27,000,000 in grants this year, an increase of almost \$6,000,000.

2. A government-sponsored corporation known as Nova Scotia Development Limited backed partly by private capital to encourage industrial expansion.

3. A hospital planning commission to make plans and proposing financing methods for a joint-federal-provincial hospital insurance scheme.

4. Provincial aid to municipalities for housing and slum clearance projects in co-operation with Ottawa.

5. Higher old age, blind and disability assistance payments to a maximum \$46 a month.

He will also make the presentation of the victory Dry Cleaners trophies to individual members of the All Star team chosen by popular vote from the teams in the Island Senior Hockey League.

The Summerside Rotary Club and the management of the Victory Dry Cleaners have combined to complete arrangements through which the crippled children of this city will be special guests at the game, and this entertainment for the youngsters coincides with the current campaign on behalf of area will be special guests at the Crippled Children's Fund.

Opening remarks at the start of the game will be made by Dr. Roy Grant, followed by remarks by the general chairman of the program, R. L. Mollison, of the Summerside Rotary Club.

The newly elected Queen of Summerside High School, Natalie Johnston, will present flowers from the flower cart to the girls in the crippled children's party and to Mrs. Aubin Gallant, mother of the little boy who will represent the other crippled children at the center ice ceremonies.

Hockey sticks which will be autographed by the players on the All Star team will be presented to the boys, and miniature cups and saucers will be presented to the girls. The sticks and cups and saucers have been supplied by Holmans for this purpose. Miniature autographed hockey pucks will be presented to the boys by Forbes Kennedy of the Chicago Black Hawks. The presentation of autographed pictures of the Aces will be made to the boys and girls members of the Aces hockey team.

Between the periods refreshments and treats will be supplied to the boys and girls by Rogers and Arnett, Ltd., Perfection Dairy, and J. and T. Morris.

The first and second periods of the game will be held at the Stadium to care for the crippled children at the game.

These children will be coming from such places as North Tryon, Central Bedeque, Summerside, Elerslie, Abrams Village, Egmont Bay, Tryon, Spring Valley, Indian River, Mont-Carmel, etc.

All of the children six years or older who were listed with the Red Cross House in Charlottetown, and who are resident in this area and who could be contacted by telephone, have been called and an invitation extended to enjoy the entertainment being prepared for them at the Stadium this evening.

Because of the anticipated large crowd which will be in attendance, the committee has asked that all of the children be at the rink prior to 8 o'clock, and a temporary assembly point for the children is being set up in the check room to the left inside the main entrance, and special seating and viewing accommodation for these children is being provided by the Stadium manager.

Cabinet Changes Likely Before Federal Election

Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP) — Prime Minister St. Laurent likely will make some changes in his cabinet before a June vote, federal informants say.

There was no indication how extensive these may be. One suggestion was that only a few portfolios may be involved.

Some of the changes may be announced next week just before Mr. St. Laurent leaves Wednesday night for an Easter holiday at Quebec City.

At that time he may also name some new senators and members of the 100,000,000 Canada Council to aid Canadian culture. Former Defence Minister Claxton, now an insurance company executive, likely will be named chairman.

PRUDHMAN WON'T RUN
Minister Prudhman has already announced he will not run again and there has been speculation that State Secretary Pinard also may step out. Mr. Pinard represents Chambly - Rouville in Quebec.

Mr. Prudhman, member for Edmonton West, is the Alberta cabinet representative and it is reported Mr. St. Laurent may pick either Mayor William Jawrelak of Edmonton or Mayor Don Mackay of Calgary as a replacement choice. Both have accepted Lib-

eral nominations for the June election.

Lionel Chevrier, former transport minister and now president of the St. Lawrence Seaway Authority, may be brought back into the cabinet to help cement Liberal strength in Quebec.

Currently, there are 17 vacancies in the 102-seat Senate.

There has been some speculation Mr. Prudhman now may go to the upper chamber.

LIBERALS HAVE BIG EDGE
Present Senate standing: Liberals 77; Conservatives 5 independent 2; Independent Liberal 1; vacant 17.

The last appointments to the Senate were four last January and 13 in July, 1955.

It appears likely former Deputy Minister Brook Claxton will be appointed chairman of the 21-member Canada Council for a five-year term. Rev. Georges-Henri Levesque of Laval University is expected to be named vice-chairman also for five years.

The council is to be given a lot of leeway in making its own decisions on how to aid Canadian culture but it would report to Parliament through some government department. It is understood Mr. St. Laurent plans to have this reporting done through Citizen ship Minister Pickersgill.
