Red Cross Campaign Now Reaching \$20,000 Mark

While still far from the provincial objective, the 1953 Red Cross Campaign returns now total in the vicinity of \$20,000 with Charlottetown's receipts slightly ahead of the same time last year. Queen's County results are coming in well, but there are still a great many districts to report. Due to an unavoidable delay the canvass is just getting underway in most of Prince County outside Summerside but the Chairman, Mr. R. T. Hawthorn, expects to have a good report to make about the end of May. King's County is fairly well organized and every effort is being made to secure canvassers for every district.

Letters being received at Red Cross Campaign Headquarters in Charlottetown in response to requests for canvassers sent out by Brig. W. W. Reid, as Provincial Campaign Chairman, reveal that those contacted have a keen appreciation of the valuable services being provided by this great organization on behalf of its subscribers who are its members.

Mr. John DuPasquier, of Forest Hill, who, with his wife, operates Long Valley Farm where registered Shorthorns are the specialty writes: "I will be glad to cooperate and take care of the collecting in Forest Hill district with my wife's help. Despite a

very busy time on the farm we consider it a duty and a privilege to contribute to such a worthy cause."

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson MacDonald undertook the canvass of John-Queen's River district this year with good results. Mr. Carl Wood of Farmington at whose home a Red Cross First Aid Post is located and operated voluntarily by several members of his family who have received Red Cross First Aid Training, when asked about the canvass in his district replied: "I will either have someone collect or collect myself if it can be left until about the middle of June since we are in the midst of the cropping season at the present time. He added that, in the meantime, he would try to have the young people in the district promote a dance in aid of the Red Cross. The Borden Women's Institute recently held a cake sale to host the amount of the subscriptions they expect to collect from a house to house canvass in the near future.
