The Protestant group attended the Presbyterian Church where the color parties were the five patrol leaders. The Union Jack was carried by Carol Meyer and the Guide world flag by Leslie Woodside. The scout standard was carried by Roland Pickard.

The minister, Rev. J. Donald MacKay, delivered the sermon. The Old Testament scripture was read by Scott James Straight, and the New Testament by Sea Ranger Nancy Woodside.

From the story of Samuel, the minister stressed the value of "obedience" in his sermon. Three members in each youth group separately led the other members of their troops from the pulpit in the reading of "The Promise".

W. Alison Choral Soc. Peases With Concert

The following was written especially for The Guardian by Christopher Geddie, director of music for P.E.I. schools.

One of the better-kept secrets of the year was sprung on an appreciative audience Saturday night in the gleaming new auditorium of the new West Kent School, when the Mount Allison University Choral Society, under the capable leadership of Professor Stanley Saunders, gave a varied concert.

This is what happened: a rare, intensely feeling and song atmosphere; Truly Flamerfelt, who excelled in a humorous song, the Statutory Lawyers, and Margaret Murray of Kensington, P.E.I., who sang Purcell's "If Music Be the Food of Love" with feeling and charm.

ISLAND SONG
Miss Murray was not so much at home in her solo number as the Vividly Gloria, Cool I understand that this was due to "circumstances beyond her control." As an encore she sang, with beautiful control of tone, "Take me to a Green Country," by island composer Walter McNutt. This song is becoming increasingly known and well-loved, and deservedly so.

The female voices sang a charming and deceptively simple arrangement of a Welsh folk song by their conductor, Stanley Saunders, while the male voices contributed a roistering Newfoundland song arranged by Donald Cook, the main accompanist for the evening, and himself a Newfoundland vocalist. They could have roistered a bit more.

Incidentally Professor Cook, coming to the island next month to give an organ recital in Trinity United Church, has the sponsorship of the Charlottetown Centre of the Royal Canadian College of Organists. He accompanied very efficiently throughout, though somebody should have told him that the tone of the piano, being off the stage, was carrying too much and tended to spoil the balance.

It was possible with the choral numbers the choir was able to display to better advantage its command of range and legato style. Professor Saunders has obviously worked hard to achieve this, and the result was felt this to be the most satisfying part of the concert. Thank you, Mr. A., and all again - yours,
