Morell Legion

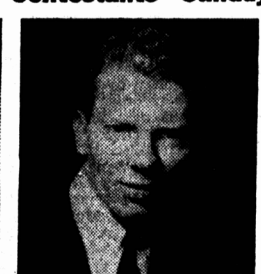
