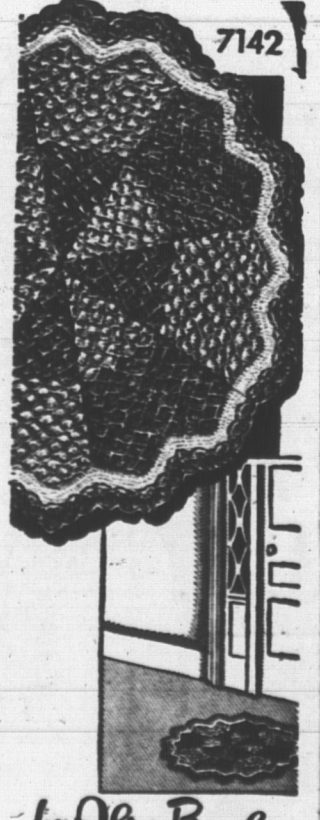

Little Kindly Understanding May Help Ease Tension

Dear Mary Haworth: The many comments on the letter from the housewife suffering from culture shock since moving to Washington from New York encourages me to tell my story. My husband was in the Air Force for 14 years, so I am used to moving about and readjusting. But in the service there are always wives' clubs and smaller groups within these clubs, to help you get acclimated. Now we are civilians and my husband has held his present government job for 18 months and the children and I have been here for nine months. I have yet to be welcomed by anyone or invited anywhere. The women I've met are limited to this apartment area - fairly nice, fairly expensive and close to my husband's work. With the exception of one Army officer's wife, they are married to electricians, carpenters, pipe fitters, etc., whose incomes probably equal ours. They have few interests outside the family, haven't been to college and, in general, haven't even learned literate English. After hearing "ain't" and "we was" too many times, I cut and run. I must say they are friendly and agreeable but I'd prefer more stimulating company. I am sure there are people in this populous area whom we would enjoy knowing; but finding them is the problem. Volunteer work might help, but with pre-school-age children at home, and without friends or relatives in the area to baby-sit, that "solution" must wait. Also, problems often solve themselves if you have someone with whom to discuss them; but there again, I see no help at present. Incidentally, much as I enjoy your column, I am dismayed by the frequency with which you recommended counselling therapy. Many of us might appreciate such help, but simply can't afford it. Also many persons with larger problems deserve priority with the therapists. Occasionally just a little kindly understanding will ease a lot of tension and that's why people turn to columns such as yours. I will continue to read you in hopes of finding more practical, immediate solutions. Sincerely, C.B.

Breakfast Coffee Cake Delight From A Package

"LET'S celebrate the end of the first week of successful, organized spring cleaning with a nice warm coffee cake for breakfast," said the Chef.

"I mean the new coffee cake that's baked in the foil pan that comes in the package. To me this coffee cake is a real convenience food. It is tasty; it is inexpensive; just 30 minutes from mixing to table. The dry ingredients are ready - mixed and come in a bag packed in a foil baking pan, along with a big envelope of excellent topping mix."

"Here's how the coffee cake is put together, and there's only one dish to wash: a measuring cup."

Measurements level; recipes for 6

QUICK - CINNAMON TOPPED COFFEE CAKE 1 (1 1/2 oz.) pkg. easy coffee cake mix 1 egg, unbeaten 1/2 c. milk

Put egg and milk into large bag of packaged mix. Squeeze upper part of bag to force air out. Close top of bag by holding tight between thumb and index finger. With bag resting on table, mix by working the bag vigorously with fingers. Mix 40 seconds or until egg is completely incorporated.

Squeeze bag to empty batter into special aluminum foil pan contained in package. (Do not oil pan.) Sprinkle topping contained in the smaller bag evenly over the batter. Bake at 375 degrees F. about 25 min. Open corners of the pan; cut coffee cake.

Variations Here in the test - kitchen we often vary this coffee cake. Blueberry: Mix batter as directed. Stir 1/2 c. fresh, frozen or canned blueberries (drained) over batter in foil pan. Cover with the topping; bake. Apricot - Swirl: Mix batter as directed. Swirl 2 tbsp. apricot

WOOL OUTPUT DOWN OTTAWA (CP) - Canadian wool production declined 6.7 per cent last year to 6,346,000 pounds from 6,812,000 in the previous year. At the same time, the bureau of statistics reported Friday, imports rose 5.4 per cent to 63,944,000 pounds while exports dropped 30.9 per cent to 3,223,000 pounds from 4,661,000.
