Thailand Officials Fighting Master Subversion Plan

BORN, Thailand (AP)—An isolated police station is attacked before dawn by a small band of men who fire and run. A mountain village headman is shot down from ambush.
To people here in northeast Thailand, it is the "forest men" on the rampage again.
But to worried Thai officials and counter-insurgency experts, its part of a chillingly familiar plan for Communist terrorism in the most underdeveloped area of this relatively well-fed nation.
Experts are sure that the increasingly frequent ambushes and assassinations along muddy forest tracks are the first stage of what Communists hope will be a repeat of the Viet Nam affair.
There is widespread conviction the plan was drafted in Peking and Hanoi, then ordered translated into action in mid-1965.
BLOODSHED SPREADS
In recent months, there has been bloodshed in several areas, particularly in the northeast's Phu Phan mountains, where by estimate 500-600 terrorists are operating, and the southwest, where guerrillas move near the Malaysian border.
Mostly circumstantial evidence is cited to support the theory that Communist China and North Viet Nam are involved directly in the terrorism. Captured weapons are mainly U.S. made, and the terrorist chief never has been publicly identified.
Officials point, however, to implicit warnings from Peking and Hanoi that Thailand is the next battleground for a "national liberation struggle."
The terrorism is like that unleashed in the early days of Viet Nam's guerrilla war.
Information available in Udon and in the capital, Bangkok, gives this picture of how terrorists operate:
MENACING GUNS
A band of five to 20 men emerges unannounced from a forest hideout for propaganda work in a village. Automatic weapons, apparently smuggled from neighboring Laos, are held menacingly.
The village headman and teacher are forced to summon all villagers for a lecture that charges Bangkok with neglect of farmers, corruption and ties with "U.S. imperialism."
The Communist leader is low-key in his approach.
"How much money did you earn last month?" he asks.
"How much money did the Bangkok merchants earn?"
He asks this of men who earn about \$70 annually, compared with the per-capita national average of \$120.
Young men are asked to sign protests. Those who do may learn their signatures "unfortunately fell into police hands and that for safety they must join the Communists in the mountains."
There are few summary executions unless a headman or teacher resists the intruders and tries to give leadership to the frightened villagers.
DEATH TOLL MOUNTS
In 1964, about one official or policeman was assassinated monthly. In the last six months of 1965, 35 were killed. In the first half of 1966 the rate doubled.

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U.S. Demand For Steel Is Steady

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—Since the week ended July 9 the U.S. output of steel for ingots and castings has not varied week to week more than 35,000 tons, or about four hours production. Steel magazine says.
This steadiness and strength in the market is likely to continue well into September, except for a brief drop during Labor Day holiday week, says the weekly Journal of Steel, working published Sunday.
August's ingot output will be 11,000,000 tons, or 300,000 tons more than July's, which was the second highest on record for that month—exceeded only by July, 1965, when users were stockpiling as a hedge against a possible strike, Steel says.
EXPECT RECORD
If over-all demand holds, Steel says, 1966 could exceed by 3,500,000 tons the 1965 record production of 131,500,000 tons.
Last weeks estimated ingot production of 2,501,000 net tons was unchanged from the preceding week, Steel says.
With nearly all September delivery orders from the auto industry already in, the total isn't as large as had been expected, the magazine says. But construction, machinery builders and railways are keeping demand strong. It is likely that mills will have a carry-over into 1967 of orders for railway rail. Steel says.
"Military requirements for steel are growing," Steel says.
There was a 33-cent-a-ton decline on the soft market for scrap steel, with steel composite on No. 1 heavy melting dropping to \$29.50 a gross ton last week.
