(Continued from page 1) the lot of our own people, bring it up to the level of other Canadians, we won't have any one here to look after the tourists. After all our citizens are here all year.

"The average tourist is here for about two weeks. Our people are entitled to good roads and it is the duty of the government to see that they get them. Some may argue that we cannot afford them. I believe we cannot afford to be without them. They are an investment which will, I am confident, bring good and lasting benefits to the Province.

TOURIST ROADS "On top of our paving program was superimposed the tourist roads program. This project, designed previously as a means to develop tourism, will at the same time do much for local residents, and is a very welcome addition to our provincial scheme. In all 93 miles of pavement were laid in 1958.

"For 1959, present indications point to another big year's work that our gravel supplies are not on highways. It is unfortunate adequate for a large paving program, and much gravel, as well as asphalt, must be brought in by rail.

"The recent increase in freight rates will on the basis of last year's work, cost this department least \$150,000 a sum which would pave an additional six miles of much needed road."

Canadian Cod Said Prominent On Rebel Fare

TORONTO (CP)—Ottawa freelance photographer Eric Duschmieri, 28, who was at Fidel Castro's headquarters in the last stages of the Cuban revolt, said Friday the rebels lived mainly on Canadian cod, fried bananas and beans in their march to victory.

Duschmieri, who spent six weeks filming behind the rebel lines, said the fish was landed secretly at a coastal rendezvous. He said the rebels also got supplies from ships they captured. One of them carried a consignment of hula hoops and the fact caught on quickly among Castro's men.

Snow Hampers Icebreakers

MONTREAL (CP)—Icebreaker operation continued Friday in the ice-clogged St. Lawrence River as a heavy fall of slushy snow hampered efforts to reach 13 impounded salt water ships trapped by an ice barricade in Montreal harbor.

The 13 foreign ships, all bound for overseas destinations, were trapped in the port, almost 1,000 miles from the Atlantic Ocean, by an abnormally early and extra long cold snap that filled the river with ice.

The ice breaker, d'Iberville working out of Sorel, about 60 miles from Montreal, was held at her berth by poor visibility most of Friday, but was expected to push westwards today, if visibility permits, in a major bid to reach Montreal by the weekend. But conditions in the river—hard to predict at the best of times—were tricky after a mild spell and a sticky snowfall Friday.

Four icebreakers working out of Trois-Rivieres, about 90 miles from Montreal, are concentrating on keeping channels open in Lake St. Peter. The lake is a shallow widening of the river above Trois-Rivieres.

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Japs Undersell In Steel Tubing

SAULT STE. MARIE, Ont. (CP) — A spokesman for Mannesmann Tube Company said Friday quality steel tubing comparable to that produced here for all and gas drilling is being sold on world markets by Japan at prices 20 per cent lower.

Mannesmann, a subsidiary of the German Mannesmann, A.G., steel company, will begin installation Monday of new machinery to produce specially-hardened steel tubing to meet this stiff Japanese competition, he added. The machinery provides for a special heat treatment process to harden tubing for deep drilling.

Investment Firm Goes Bankrupt

SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Taco Holdings Ltd., an investment firm in operation here three years, was ordered into receivership today by Mr. Justice L. McC. Ritchie in the chancery division of the New Brunswick Supreme Court.

The action was brought by a number of shareholders claiming misuse of funds. They are seeking recovery of \$90,000. Also ordered into receivership were Defencer Holdings Ltd., Robert P. Young, Guy J. Mann and Fred W. Warman.

The court ruling means that as much money as possible will be collected and placed in the hands of the receiver. Later, those having claims against the company may seek recovery of their money.

CUT COFFEE PRICE

TORONTO (CP) — A Toronto grocery store chain cut coffee prices by three to eight cents a pound today. The brand with the eight-cent reduction went down to 79 cents a pound.
