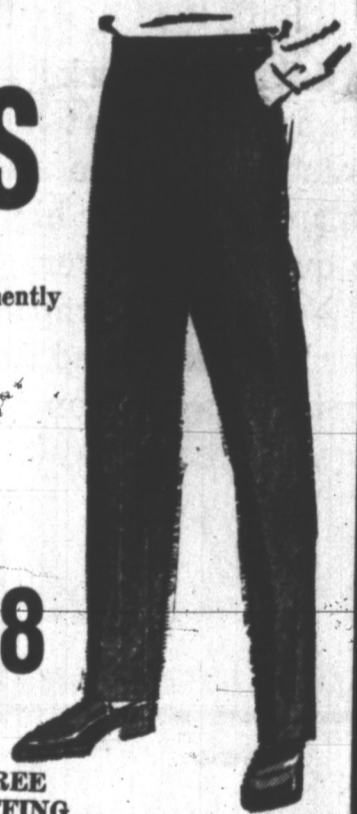

Ferry Expenditures Listed In Estimates

OTTAWA — The 1962-63 federal estimates for the department of transport include an amount of \$350,000 for payment toward the new ferry The Confederation.
The ferry, which was launched at Halifax in the fall, is expected to go into service this spring on the run from Cape Tormentine in New Brunswick to Borden on P.E.I.
Last year's vote for the same purpose was \$1,545,000. Estimated cost of the vessel is \$3,800,000.
Operation of the Prince Ed-

ward Island car ferry and terminals in the calendar year of 1962 will cost the government \$3,359,000. This is the amount included in the estimates for the Canadian National Railway in payment of deficits on the operation. The figure is an increase of \$14,000 over the \$3,345,000 provided in the 1961-62 estimates.
In addition, the construction or acquisition of buildings, works, land equipment for the P.E.I. ferry service is estimated at \$1,137,000 in the coming fiscal year. This compares with \$980,000 last year.

104 low-level jet bomber program will cost at least \$117,700,000. The next largest amount is \$27,000,000 for naval destroyers, a program which will be completed next year.

In the post-war period, expenditures on weapons reached their peak in 1953-54 at \$768,000,000. They declined to \$298,481,000 in '59-60—the Arrow interceptor had been cancelled six weeks before the start of that year—and to \$285,032,000 in 1960-61.

They advanced slightly in the current fiscal year to about \$300,000,000 but will decline again in the coming fiscal year to \$282,000,000, the lowest figure since the NATO defence buildup started more than a decade ago.

Test Ban Group Holds Meeting

GENEVA (Reuters) — The leaders of the American and British delegations to the nuclear test-ban conference which broke up in failure last month conferred here for two hours Wednesday with Soviet delegation leader Beryon Tsarapkin.

Western sources said no change in the Soviet position emerged from the talks, held at Tsarapkin's invitation. The test-ban conference broke up Jan. 29 when the Russians insisted talks should be based on their draft treaty of Nov. 28 last year.

The West would not accept this, saying it abandoned the principle of international inspection and control—the basis until then of the negotiations—and provided only for a moratorium on underground tests and national inspection systems.

Western sources said the Western representatives would continue to stand by here so they can quickly respond to any Soviet approach indicating a willingness to reopen the conference on a basis acceptable to the West.

Spending On New Weapons Hits Low Ebb In Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — Defence department spending on new weapons and equipment will fall in 1962-63 to its lowest point since the period between the Second World War and Korean War.
Estimates of federal spending in the year beginning April 1, 1962, presented to Parliament Monday, show that expenditures for this purpose will be \$262,000,000 out of a total defence outlay of \$1,675,792,175.
On July 29, 1960, the Commons defence committee said in its report:

"The proportion of budgetary allocations for the acquisition of equipment has been declining in relation to total defence allocation. The committee recommends that a serious study of the implications of this trend be undertaken."

Officials said Tuesday they have been studying this problem seriously for years and that there appear to be only two alternatives: A big manpower cut in the 135,000-man armed forces or a substantial increase in the defence budget.

The government—the present one and its Liberal predecessor—has not accepted either of these alternatives. A 15,000-man increase in the armed forces was authorized last September and a fairly tight lid has been kept on the defence budget, which has not varied greatly for five years.

Defence authorities said the problem is becoming more difficult all the time. Not only does it cost more to maintain and operate the forces—pay, food, fuel and the like—but the cost of weapons and equipment goes up about five per cent every year.

In the coming fiscal year there will be only one major procurement program. The CF

KINGSTON, Ont. (CP) — One hundred students have signed a petition demanding a plebiscite to decide whether Gaelic or French should be the second official language used on stationery of the Queen's University-Alma Mater Society.

Queen's, founded by royal charter as a Presbyterian institute, has a strong link with Scotland.

The society disclosed Wednesday its executive last month agreed on a recommendation that French be the second language for stationery letter heads.

This week's petition move was sparked by a group of medical students. The entire student body of the university must vote on the question.
