Contract Bridge

But though the issue was obscured by North's bidding, South should not have taken the chance he did take in passing to six hearts. Of course he could not dream that North was void of spades, and so he could not hope to make a grand slam at clubs, but he nevertheless should have bid seven clubs. If East-West could fulfill their slam, the loss to North-South would be enormous — about 1500 points. If they were defeated, the gain would be only about 100 points, plus the gain of not taking the presumable sacrifice at seven clubs. It was this disproportion that should have induced the proper decision. Since North had failed to take the right action, South, as the last to speak for his side, should have outbid the opponents.

Of course if East-West used the same correct philosophy they would go to a grand slam on their own

Encouraging Results In Cancer Treatment

GENEVA, (Reuters)—A British doctor reported "encouraging results" today from a new treatment against the recurrence of genital and breast cancer after an operation.

Prof. A. A. Loeser of London's St. Saviour's Hospital, was addressing an international congress on gynaecology here.

"The mistake made in our cancer therapy is that we begin the fight against cancer with great vigor," he said, "but we stop the battle too early without having tried post-operative prophylactic treatment against the killer's recurrence".

THYROID HORMONE

He said that since October 1949, he had given daily doses of thyroid hormone to patients who had undergone operations for genital or breast cancer, and there was only one recurrence of the disease among 18 patients whom he had treated for more than four to five years.

While thyroid hormones cannot destroy the actual cancer cells, they can keep the cancer cells dormant, he added.

"It must be our essential task to keep dormant cancer cells which were left behind in the body after a radical operation, and to prevent them from awakening," Loeser said.
