SEAL CARON.—Canadian and United States sealing vessels which have been operating on the Japanese coast have completed the season's work. The Canadian fleet of 41 vessels, 44,669 skins for 35 vessels, an average of 1,276. The United States squadron has captured 20,289 skins for 25 vessels, an average of 811. The largest United States catch is 1,724. Several of the Nova Scotia vessels bring or send home 1,750 to 2,000 skins each.
