# Barwell, Worden May Be Key To Roughrider Attack

VANCOUVER (CP) — Focus around the headquarters of Saskatchewan Roughriders centres on Hugh Campbell and George Reed, but two unsung receivers could emerge today as vital figures in the Grey Cup.

Ends Jim Worden and Gord Barwell operated all season in the shadow of their illustrious team-mates, but combined for 55 pass receptions and six touchdowns.

The figures are not overwhelming when compared with statistics generated by flanker Campbell and fullback Reed,

but Saskatchewan officials are aware of the value of Worden and Barwell.

Worden was named to Western Conference All-Star team although he finished 14th in pass-receiving statistics. He hauled in 28 passes from quarterback Ron Lancaster for 462 yards and Barwell caught 27 passes for 480 yards.

Each had two touchdowns. Worden's all-star selection was a tribute to his blocking prowess. Line coach Jim Duncan said he is one of the best blockers in the league, devastating on short-yardage situations.

Campbell caught 66 passes and led the conference in scoring with a record 17 touchdown receptions and often is double-teamed by opponents. This coverage leaves Worden and Barwell free in many critical situations.

Jack Gotta, who coaches the

Saskatchewan ends and backfielders, describes Worden as "a tough receiver who can catch the ball in traffic."

Coach Eagle Keys has leaned toward a passing attack most of the season although Reed led the conference in rushing with 1,409 yards. In addition, Reed caught 16 passes for 175 yards.

The club closed its pre-game workouts Friday with another light timing drill. After practice, Keys and general manager Ken Preston moved the players into seclusion until after the game.

Keys reported all players fit, although Ron Atchison has a fractured transverse process—a funny spur on the spine. The injury, originally diagnosed as strained back muscles and cracked ribs, is painful, but the veteran will play.

"A man can't sit out a game as important as this just because his back hurts," said Atchison, entering his first Grey Cup final in a 15-year career.

Tackle Reg Whitehouse, who joined Saskatchewan with Atchison in 1962, will start despite a strained achilles tendon. Whitehouse said this week he will end his career after the game.

Ted Urnes, all-star centre, reported himself fit although he suffered a concussion in the first game of the western final against Winnipeg, and lost his memory after being hit on the head again in the second.

Halfback Paul Dudley has been declared out due to a bruised kidney. Ed Buchanan will provide his breakaway speed in Dudley's spot.

## Boston On Move As Detroit Sinks

Boston Bruins are making one of their most impressive showings in years with the help of Gerry Cheevers' goaltending, but Detroit Red Wings have become disenchanted with the netminding of Roger Crozier.

Crozier, in goal Thursday night when the Bruins blasted Detroit 3-3 in a National Hockey League game in Boston, has been benched indefinitely by manager-coach Sid Abel. Hank Bassen, Crozier's backup goalie, will be in the nets tonight when the Wings play Montreal Canadiens in Montreal.

Abel said Friday he cannot understand Crozier's trouble, but added it will be some time before he plays again.

This is the first time since Crozier joined the Wings two years ago that he has been benched for poor play, but Abel is in desperate need of an improved defensive performance from his club. The Wings have lost five in a row and are in last place, three points behind Montreal.

**BRUINS-LEAFS TANGLE**  
The Bruins, meanwhile, play the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs tonight in Toronto while the league-leading Chicago Black Hawks visit New York Rangers for a game this afternoon.

Toronto is at New York and Chicago at Boston Sunday night. Cheevers, 25, was called up to Boston from Oklahoma City Blazers of the Central Professional League Nov. 9 after reminder Ed Johnston suffered an eye injury.

The Leafs, meanwhile, expect to have centre Red Kelly ready to play tonight and Sunday, despite a cut and bruise he suffered under his eye Thursday in practice. The mishap occurred when a shot glanced off the stick of goalie Johnny Bower and hit him in the face.
