

Centre Gallery To Stage A New Sculpture Show

Confederation Centre Gallery will play host to its most unusual exhibition yet beginning Tuesday, September 20, when Zbigniew Blazej, opens his Audio - Kinetic Environment show, a combination of free standing in relief sculpture which moves in concert with electronic music also composed by the artist.

The exhibition will be officially opened Tuesday evening before an invited guest list of gallery members, but it will go on view to the public Tuesday morning.

The exhibition has been seen in Toronto and several western cities, but the Centre gallery will have the first showing in the Maritimes. Next spring the show will be on view at Expo '67.

The exhibition consists of brightly painted wood and plastic sculptures in a modernistic assortment of geometric shapes and sizes. They can be viewed independently of the music, but the exhibition makes its greatest impact as the sculptures move with the electronically composed background music.

All three factors, sculpture, sound and movement combine to form the environment in which viewers find themselves.

Performances of the show will be given at fifteen minute intervals during regular gallery hours.

UC Plans To Consider Bishops

WATERLOO, Ont. (CP)—The United Church of Canada will consider changing its structure to include bishops no matter what form the proposed union with the Anglican Church takes.

"It is something we'll have to face sooner or later," said Dr. E. E. Long, United Church secretary.

The general council of the church, meeting here, referred a committee report on bishops to presbyteries and congregations for further study.

The United Church has a conciliar form of government in which there are no bishops.

Dr. Long and Dr. J. B. Corston of Halifax, chairman of the committee on bishops, said no decision had yet been made on what powers bishops in the United Church would have.

Dr. Long said bishops would possibly be pastors to the pastors, but he did not speculate on their role in church government.

NEED FELT
"As it is now nobody seems to know who to go to with a problem, and at times it is very hard for a committee to be a father-in-God to the ministers."

The report noted that Methodist, Congregational and Presbyterian churches in Australia are considering bishops while negotiating union.

"We must be prepared to understand the significance of the episcopacy as it has been preserved and developed by our sister communions," the report said.

In other business Wednesday, the council approved a \$35,000 research centre to study ministry problems and needs in urban communities.

The proposed centre, to be located in an undetermined metropolitan area, will provide consultative services for presbyteries, boards and councils in analysing community and social changes.

Rickets Said Rie Problem

OTTAWA (CP)—Rickets is a serious health problem in Eastern Canada, a Montreal pediatrician said here.

Dr. Richard Goldbloom said 67 infants, suffering from the disease that softens bones, have been admitted to a Montreal hospital so far this year.

Many of the cases were severe, he told a conference of the Associated Milk Foundations of Canada.

Dr. Goldbloom said studies in Ottawa, Toronto and Montreal indicate the infants affected drank whole cows' milk lacking vitamin D.

"It's amazing to hear about rickets in this day and age," Dr. Goldbloom said.

Farmers Show Interest In Association's Tour

Farmers from East Baltic in the east to St. Phillips in Prince County showed keen interest in a corn tour, or field day, sponsored Friday by the Prince Edward Island Beef Producers' Association.

The tour got underway at the farm of Sterling MacRae, Greenvale, went from there to the corn plots of the Experimental Farm and finished up a most interesting day with a visit to the corn fields—he has more than 100 acres in all—of Leo P. McIsaac and Sons, Mermaid.

Louis Cormier, St. Philip—the post office address is Richmond—was the man who came farthest from the Western part of the province. The Matheson brothers, Albert and Wilfred, from Bellevue, held the Eastern distance record at Mr. MacRae's.

TOUR FIELDS
But Major Reid, Rollo Bay; J.B. McIsaac, Rock Barra and a man from East Baltic whose name was not available, lengthened the Eastern perimeter considerably when some 70 farmers toured the McIsaac fields later in the afternoon. Mr. McIsaac is the beef producers' association president.

Mr. MacRae had 24 acres of corn with the same number of varieties and the visitors listened with keen interest as the young farmer described the uses of fertilizer application, the weed control efforts, the planting times and other details of interest to agriculturists.

Mr. MacRae is going to store some of his corn in a horizontal, or trench type slip, he told The Guardian. The rest he hopes to store in an enlarged upright silo.

Mr. MacRae also showed the visitors some barley which has been yielding up to 70 bushels to the acre. All of it is not yet harvested.

Mr. McIsaac had ears of corn arranged from each of the 19 varieties he grows on slightly more than 100 acres at Mermaid, so the farmers could see and

evaluate the relative value and see the various stages of development.

Both men use atrazine as a weed control. Mr. MacRae said he uses about three pounds to the acre. Mr. McIsaac uses three to four pounds. The control is really good.

There is danger in using too much of this weed control if the land is not to be planted to corn again the following year, several department of agriculture field men warned yesterday. The danger, it was explained, is that the land would not produce a grain crop the following year, certainly not oats; though that was questioned by at least one corn grower.

Don Wood, the fertilizer man from Kensington, spoke briefly and said that corn is a high energy, low protein food. But addition of Calrea increases the protein content at a low relative cost, he said.
