Local and Other Items.

SOCIAL AT WEST RIVER.—Owing to the storm last Monday night the social to have been held in Afton hall was postponed until Monday next, the 20th inst., when special efforts will be made to ensure a pleasant evening. All who can should attend.

PETRIFIED BODY FOUND.—The body of a woman buried in Winchester, Ky., thirty-three years ago, was recently exhumed and found to be petrified. The body was buried in a metallic casket. The face had a natural appearance, and in one hand was a rose which was perfect in its petrified shape.

BASKET SOCIAL.—The basket social previously announced to be held in the Stanley Bridge Hall on February 28th has been changed to February 20th. A good programme is being prepared and no doubt the social will be a grand success. Several from Charlottetown will take part.

ATTACKED BY CROWS.—According to an exchange a farmer in Kentucky went out the other day with his boy to shoot the crows tearing up his wheat, when the birds combined in an attack on both of them, and when the battle was over, the boy had run away and the man was bleeding all over from the pecks he had received. It is thought his eyes have been completely destroyed.

GOT BIG DAMAGES.—A verdict of \$24,500 was returned in New York last week in a suit for \$75,000 damages brought by Walter E. Ederly, of Brooklyn, against the Long Island Railroad company for the loss of both legs on Oct. 30, 1897. Ederly and a companion were crossing the company's tracks on a tandem bicycle. A flagman lowered a gate, which pinned the bicycle fast to the ground. An engine came along and passed over Ederly's legs.

BECOMING BETTER KNOWN.—Englishmen are being slowly educated to the fact that Canada is a great country, and that a good portion of the earth waits to yield up riches for them. The Canadian High Commissioner in London, having written to the press regarding the prospects in Canada, is receiving many enquiries, and the British papers are emphasizing the fact that those who emigrate to Canada go, not among strangers, but among their kith and kin. English capitalists still look to Canada, and a recent formation is the Bennett Lake and Klondike Navigation Co., with a capital of £100,000. The company is being criticized. The Westminster Gazette says the new shares will be left to gamblers, who have underwritten them upon terms which the directors do not find convenient to disclose, making use of the obnoxious waiver clause to hide the contracts from those whose money they seek.

—Referring to the New Brunswick elections, the Montreal Gazette remarks: It is unfortunate for Canada that very few of its elections, Federal or Provincial, can be conducted without charges of corruption being laid against the men in power. It is more unfortunate that so often there is foundation for the charges. The Emmenton government is not an exception to the rule. It has an iron bridge policy, a part of which has involved the payment of from two to three prices for the structures it bought. The evidence of the over-payment is as strong as it can be made, the excuse for it is utterly wanting. If the ministers have been honest in the matter they are self-convicted of incompetence for their duties. In either case they should be removed.

The Scallop.
 The scallop accomplishes locomotion by a series of leaps. When it is alarmed, or wishes to change its location, it opens and energetically closes its valves, thus expelling the water. The reaction shoots it backward. By this means the creature is able to travel long distances. Sometimes scallops make considerable journeys in large companies. One can scarcely imagine a lovelier sight than that of a flock of these pretty creatures, with shell of every hue, from purple and white to black, enlivened with shades of pink, yellow and fawn, darting about in clear water. In their flightlike movements, vertical, horizontal and zigzag, they are more suggestive of a flock of winged animals than of bivalve mollusks.

Ice in Polar Regions.
 When the sea freezes, first is formed the thin flake called by navigators "sludge," and as soon as this catches and holds snow it is termed "brash." When it gathers and doubles, the whalers style it "pancake" or "bay ice." If you can see the limit of this, it will be "a floe," and an "icefield" if its boundaries are out of sight.
 "Pack ice" consists of floes forced together and overlapping, and when this again becomes broken and scattered by a new wind the name of it is "sailing ice."
