Big City Tourist Bureau Studied

Directors of Maritime Provinces travel bureaus are examining the possibility of jointly operating a tourist bureau in at least one large Canadian city, possibly Montreal.

P.E.I. Travel Bureau director, George Fraser, met in Montreal Wednesday with Gerald Redmond, Nova Scotia travel bureau director, and B. A. Tweedy, New Brunswick travel bureau director, to discuss the proposal.

Mr. Fraser said the bureau could be set up by extending the three provinces' co-operative tourist advertising campaign.

"The bureau," he said, "would serve as a joint tourist office and clearing house for our Maritime advertising campaign."

The travel bureau directors will follow up the idea with their respective governments.

Mr. Fraser said that the bureau directors also plan to set up a uniform plan of gathering tourist industry statistics, such as number of visitors, number of vehicles, money spent, etc.

"At the end of the season, uniform questionnaires will be sent out by each province, and one person or firm will compile the statistics," he said.

MONETON TV DATES

While in Moncton, Mr. Fraser also lined up dates for several programs over the local television station that will deal with summer tourist events. On July 11, at 6 p.m., the program will deal with the Summerside Lobster Carnival. General tourist events will be described on program on July 25, and Old Home Week will be featured on August 13.

Lobsters May Be Kept

Island lobster fishermen, who have been unable to take in traps during the past few days because of unfavorable weather conditions, will be allowed to keep lobsters caught in the traps, a federal fisheries department official said yesterday, even though the lobster season is officially over.

The fishermen are being given a day-to-day extension on the season as a result of storm conditions that have prevented them from getting to their traps since last week.

While the fishermen are not allowed to make any new catches, they will be allowed to take any lobsters that are in their traps when they finally are able to get to them to bring them to shore.

Fishermen in the west Prince County area have been chiefly affected by the storm conditions.

SUMMERSIDE — Appearing before Magistrate R.S. Hinton QC in Summerside Police Court yesterday, Leonard Joseph Gallant, Coleman, and Robert Nelson Arcauani, 19, of Summerside, were each fined \$100 to keep of good behaviour and to keep the peace for a period of 12 months.

Joseph Basil Gallant, and Finis Robert Arcauani, fathers of the two boys, each signed a \$200 bond. The two youths were given a one year suspended sentence on a charge of attempted

theft of a motor generator on June 13.

Wendell Earl MacWilliams, Charlottetown, was fined \$100 and having pleaded guilty to a charge of screening tires. In view of the \$25 fines handed out in the past days, Police Chief P. Williams stated that MacWilliams did not deliberately screen the tires.

A second charge of speeding against MacWilliams was withdrawn.

Chief White told the court that Const. Sharp, the officer who laid the charge, chased the accused's vehicle for about half an hour. When Sharp finally got the vehicle to a stop, he was unable to away again, making it impossible for the police officer to identify the driver.

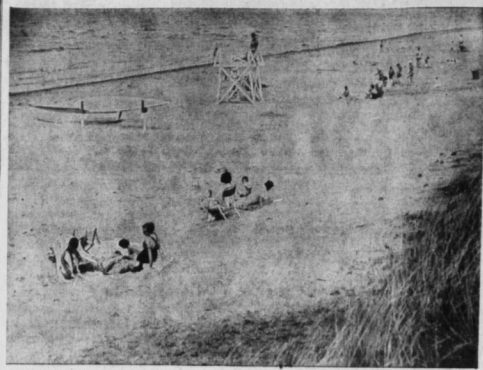
