Commends High Quality Of PEI Yorkshire Hogs

"We want all of you to be familiar with Island products at hand and in a position to tell your customers about the top-level hogs the Island farmers are turning into our Charlottetown plant for processing," said Mr. W. R. Carroll, vice-president and assistant general manager of Canada Packers at a meeting here yesterday.

More than 120 employees have been called in from the various areas in the Atlantic Provinces, including the managers, assistant managers and salesmen from Halifax, Saint John, N.B., Sydney, N.S., Cornerbrook and St. John's, Nfld. The car route salesman who cover all rural districts of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick were also in attendance.

Mr. Carroll continued, "This is our 26th annual sales convention and it gives me great pleasure to have you assembled here to attend the new plant and familiarize yourselves with its operations." Later in an interview Mr. Carroll said, "I am glad to see some improvement in the quality of beef cattle being produced on the Island. We will have no difficulty in supplying the Maritimes with Island beef when a quality product is available. When the Island farmers recognize that beef cattle are not just a by-product of a dairy farm, and exert some of the energy and foresight they have shown in developing hogs of this type, they may confidently expect equal results from beef. While beef does not command as high a price as a year ago," Mr. Carroll continued, "there are splendid prospects for a good financial return from good stock."

Regarding the pork situation, Mr. Carroll said he was pleased with the price trend and anticipated there would be a good market on pork until the fall at least, with prices kept well above the Government support price.

Highly Pleased "I read with pleasure in this morning's Guardian of the Island-type Yorkshire swine being ordered for the Central Experimental Farm at Ottawa, and for the Lennoxville Que. Farm," he said. "Orders such as these must be highly pleasing to all concerned and is an unqualified endorsement of the development which has taken place here."

In 1952 North America had the lowest number of cattle in relation to the human population, which was 600 cattle per 1,000 people. Previous to the war the figures were 1,050. The outlook for eggs and poultry is very favourable, eggs being better than usual for this time of year.

Mr. C. C. Folkinghorne, general sales manager, Mr. W. W. Lasby, Toronto plant manager, and Mr. F. W. Condin, Toronto sales manager, flew direct from Toronto with Mr. Carroll in the company plane yesterday morning. Capt. George McLean and co-pilot Tqd Lawrence after landing at Charlottetown with the Toronto party, made two round trips to Nova Scotia and Newfoundland delegation to the city.

The convention will continue today at the Charlottetown Hotel when the whole range of meat products, produce, canned goods, soap, etc., handled by Canada Packers will be dealt with in addresses by department heads and followed by a question period. Those in attendance will be tendered a dinner at the Charlottetown at the conclusion of the business sessions tomorrow evening.

Last night they held a quiet reception at their home for their family and a few close friends. Both Mr. and Mrs. Campbell are still very active and display keen interest in all events.

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Cases Yesterday In Supreme Court

Judgment in favour of the defendant for \$50 and costs was given in the Supreme Court yesterday in the case of Wendell Large, plaintiff vs Lloyd Clow and L. A. Farmer (Skyline Transfer), defendants. While driving from Charlottetown to Georgetown last December 22 the plaintiff had run into the defendant's parked truck after meeting another vehicle. Mr. G. R. Foster was counsel for the plaintiff; Messrs J. A. Gallant and J. P. Nicholson for the defendants.

In the case of John R. Skinner, plaintiff vs G. Albert Darrach, defendant judgment was given in favour of the plaintiff for \$950 and costs for damage to his car when the defendant drove through a stop sign on Belvedere Avenue on Christmas night and hit the plaintiff's car which was proceeding along the Malpeque Road. The Court found no negligence on the part of the plaintiff's driver. Messrs. R. R. Bell, Q.C. and G. R. Foster were counsel for the plaintiff; Messrs. W. E. Bentley, Q.C. and H. F. MacPhee, Q.C. for the defendant.

The Court heard the evidence of Ray Stull in the case of Marilyn Irene Bryan, plaintiff, represented by Stanley Bryenton vs Austin Maye, defendant. The claim is for damages for injuries sustained last July 22 when the plaintiff, then 5, was crossing Longworth Avenue and was allegedly struck by a vehicle owned and operated by the defendant. Plaintiff's counsel at Mr. M. Alban Farmer, Q.C.; Mr. H. F. MacPhee, Q.C. for the defendant. All cases were before Mr. Justice M. A. MacGuigan.
