## CABINET MEETS TODAY

### Agricultural Prices And Auto Deal On Agenda

SASKATOON (CP)—The federal cabinet will meet today to discuss agricultural support prices and the effect on Canada's trade of a United States law banning export of strategic goods to Communist countries.

## Trainmen Add Demands To Federal Gov't Headache

OTTAWA (CP)—A labor relations headache building up for the federal cabinet got a little more acute Wednesday with one more powerful union serving demands on the major railways.

The cabinet may have to find a solution eventually to the presently-tangled series of negotiations between the railways and their unions, with \$150,000,000 a year or more at stake.

Wednesday, the brotherhood of railroad trainmen announced here it has called on the railways for a general 25-per-cent pay boost plus other contract benefits.

#### REDS SUPPORT CUBAN REBELS

HAVANA, Cuba (AP)—Cuba's outlawed Communist party called Wednesday for a "broad democratic coalition government" and pledged support for a rebel general strike to overthrow President Fulgencio Batista.

A manifesto said the Communists are joining "all Cubans to end tyranny" and blamed "Yankee imperialism" for unemployment in the island.

Castro has demanded a crippling of communications and transportation to pave the way for the general strike he hopes will topple Batista.

#### YOUTH FACES MURDER TRIAL

SHELBURNE, N. S. (CP)—Robert Boudreau, 16, was committed to stand trial Wednesday on a murder charge laid after the body of salesman Wilfred Crouse was found on the outskirts of this community March 17.

Aubrey Blades, 17, was ordered to stand trial earlier on the same charge. Their cases will probably be tried during the June sitting of the Nova Scotia Supreme Court in Barrington.

Eighteen witnesses testified at Boudreau's preliminary hearing here Wednesday.

#### THREE TORNADOES HIT TEXAS TOWN

WICHITA FALLS, Tex. (AP)—Three tornadoes lashed this north Texas city and a suburb Wednesday night, killing at least one man.

Police, firemen and rescue crews pressed a methodical search for other possible victims.

The one known death was at Deandale, about six miles east of the city.

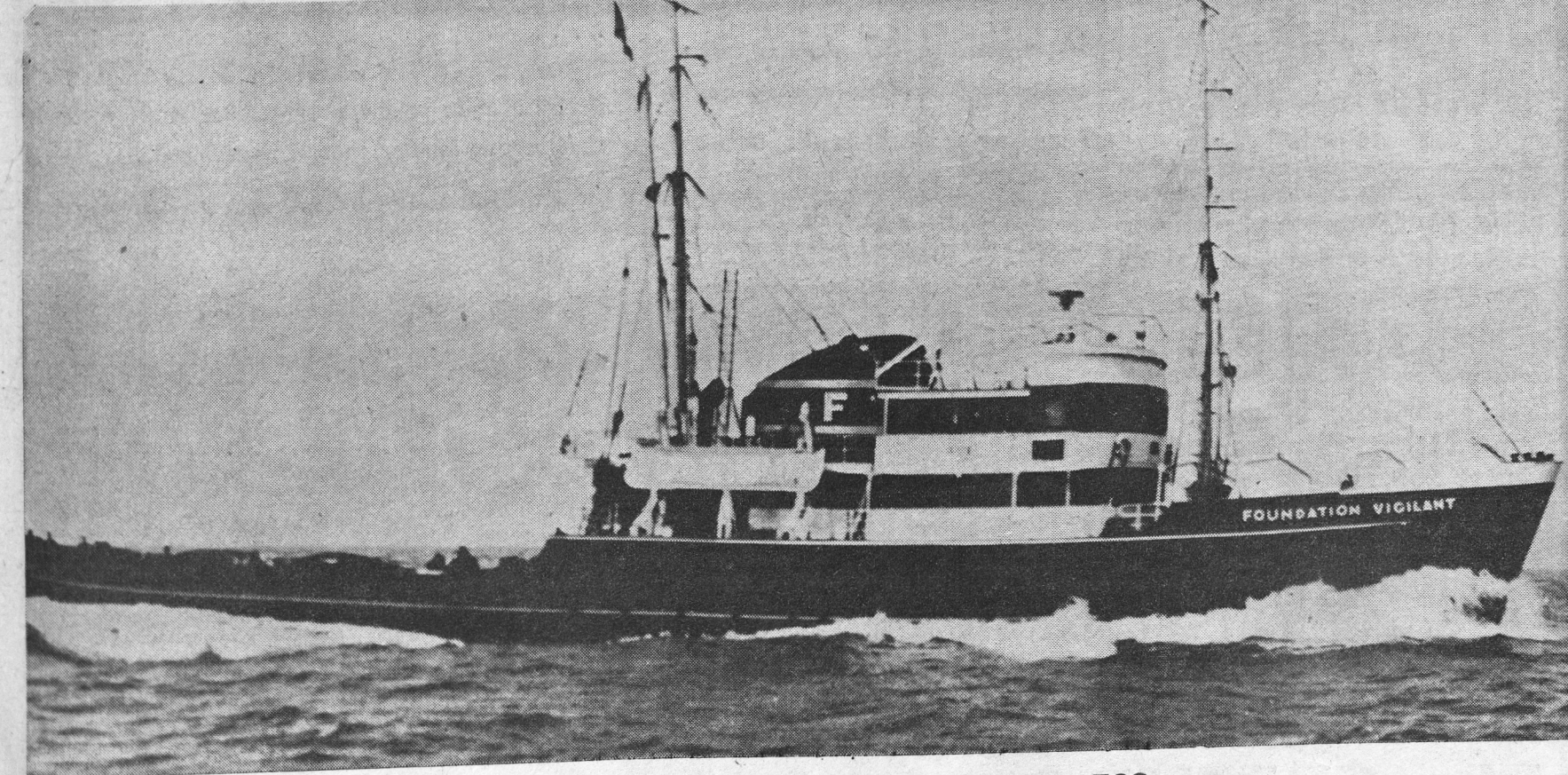
