orange peel to batter. Bake in 2 oiled 8" layer cake pans. Cool. Split each layer crosswise, making 4 layers.

Part II: To save time while cake is baking, prepare date-orange filling as follows: In saucepan, mix - sugar, corn starch and salt. Stir in water, dates, orange peel and orange pieces. When boiling reduce heat and simmer 5 min. Remove from heat; stir in nuts. Cool. Spread cooled filling between cake layers.

Part III: Prepare frosting mix, following pkg. directions. Spread on top and sides of cake. Decorate with Candied Orange Peel cut into flower shape (follows). This serves 8.

CANDIED ORANGE PEEL: Combine 1/2 c. sugar and 1 c. water in 1 qt. saucepan. Boil 5 min. to make syrup. Cut 1 large California orange into quarters; remove orange meat from peel and save to add to a fruit comp. Place peel in boiling sugar syrup and simmer 15 min. or until peel is translucent and tender. Drain and cool. Cut in desired shape and center on frosted cake to make a "flower".
