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MOOSE IN HARNESS

A CURIOUS SCENE WITNESSED AT DAKOTA FAIR.

Want Like a Real Cyclone—A Moose That Trottled Ninety Miles in a Day—Will They Become Fashionable.

One span of the captured moose mentioned in my letter on "Minnesota Moose and moose," is now being used and driven by a man in Grafton, N. D. Another is driven single by a liveryman in Emerson, Minn. One. At a recent fair or something of the sort, he was lashed to trot against a certain horse. The moose, then 3 years old, was hoked into sulky, and Harris, being a well-known horseman, was requested to drive him. The dealger with which the moose was provided was simply a basket, to which the moose was fastened. Harris insisted on giving a bit of rest, but the liveryman and the moose objected; that he was perfectly gentle and tractable in the harness, but that he did not like to be driven by a man in a sulky. Harris mounted on the sulky, but had some doubts as to the outcome of the race.

He told a male, and the horse and moose started. The latter reared out at every stride. At the first quarter post he was more than a length ahead of the horse, and before the half-mile post was received had doubled this lead. About this time, however, he concluded he wouldn't play and it out for home, striking squarely across the race course and the fair grounds for the means of a trancer. There was a great jam of people, carriages, farm wagons, half-bred carts, and the like, but when the moose started for home, he was met by a cyclone and carried his way. The way was cleared, and in spite of all the pulling and swaying Harris could do the moose went out of the grounds and down the main street of the town like a tornado. He headed for the corral, adjoining the livery stable, the gate of which happened to be open, but made a bad shot and caught one wheel of the sulky on a gatepost.

LEFT THE SHAFTS.

He went out of the shafts as if there had been none, went to the other end of the corral and stood looking at his late driver, with his ears thrown forward just as if he scented someone. Harris pulled himself out of the wrecks, badly bruised and disfigured, and says that the next time he drives a moose he will put on him the wickedest ring and chain around his neck.

Still moose do make great drivers when properly trained and handled. Their sagacious build, their long, well-formed and strongly set legs, their strength of quarter and loin and their wonderful loag development give them such power and endurance as no horse can approach. A moose will simply trot all day over any kind of ground, bog, mud falls or rocks and scarcely tire. Harris says that one morning in the winter of '90 and '91 he started from his ranch, on the Bosau river, to drive to Emerson, a distance of 90 miles. 8 or after leaving home a bull moose, with only one horn, showed up on the Big Muskeg, trotting west, parallel with the road on which Harris was driving, and only half a mile away. Harris had no gun and started out for a race. He put his horse into a run and the moose trotted easily along, well abreast for about ten miles, when he veered off to the south and was soon out of sight. Harris went into Emerson, where he was to his business, and home at 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Before he got out of town he saw the same moose coming back from the south, still in the trot, but now with his tongue hanging out and thoroughly tired. He hotted into a street of the town and started north. Harris returned and drove the moose, hooting to the townspeople to turn out and capture him.

HIS LONG RACE ENDED.

A hotel man saw him coming, ran in, got a rifle and killed him in front of his store. Harris says that he was coming from the south, during the next week or two, reported having seen a bull moose with one horn on the same day, some of them saying he had seen him as much as twenty miles south of Emerson, and all stating that he was on the trot. On figuring it out it was found that the moose had trotted at least ninety miles that day after Harris sighted him, and it was not known how far before. Some say that he would start at his own way up the Roseau early in the morning, and having encountered people at frequent intervals he had kept in a state of alarm, only to lose his life at the end of his great race.

Nate Elieron, who lives near the Roseau, in the east end of Kinton county, has a three-year-old bull moose, a moose calf and an elk calf, all caught in the woods near his farm. The bull has not yet been driven, but has been led and ridden by him. When it was there the rutting season was on. He was kept in a corral and was disposed to be ugly. No one, not even his owner, dared go inside the corral just at that time.

This Year's Seal Catch.

We use a very moderate expression when we state that the catch of seals for 1893 exceeds all expectations; the supply is excessive and exceptionally good judgment must be exercised by the trade in handling this article. The catch of Northwest coast seals reported exclusively to us reaches the extraordinary total of 135,000 skins, and some of the vessels have not yet arrived from their quest. In addition to the above we have a report from the upper Island seals, the number secured for 1893 being 32,800. We have therefore in sight—

Northwest coast skins 135,000

Copper Island skins 32,800

Alaskan skins 7,500

Total 175,300

This is a larger catch than the market requires; it is remarkable in view of the fact that our Government agents last year reported the seals practically extinct.—Fur Trade Review.
