R., arrested Philip Campbell, of P. E. I., on the cars at Sackville and conveyed him to Dorchester jail. It was reported on the train that the prisoner is one of the Campbellton post office robbers. —St. John Sun. THE coroner's jury upon the victims of the "Richelieu" disaster have returned a verdict that the four persons came to their death through the criminal negligence of the owner of the steamer, Samuel Elgarte; John Burgess, the Government Inspector; and Fréchet, the engineer. The men will be put upon their trial. THE mind of the owner of a certain valuable canine called "Jack" is much exercised to-day, owing to the said animal's continued absence from the city. He went on a hunting expedition yesterday in company with a sporting gentleman. When last seen was several yards in advance of a fine specimen of a hare, and evidently en route for the cemetery. (Sgd) JACK. We are sorry to hear that J. T. Bulmer, Esq., has resigned his connection with the Provincial Library of Nova Scotia, and that there is every probability that he will not again resume library work in the Maritime Provinces. In a new country there can be no such person as a highly trained librarian, the most that can be hoped for is that one may turn up having in some degree a fitness and aptitude for that kind of work, and the good luck to tumble into a library. Mr. Bulmer's proficiency and extraordinary success was altogether exceptional, giving himself a reputation thereby the equal of the best in America. While other librarians at the head of great collections in Canada were doing next to nothing for library progress, Mr. Bulmer was studying the best and latest methods, organizing Historical Societies and record commissions, making collections for his own and other libraries, agitating for trained librarians, and catalogues which would be a credit to our country. How successful he was as a collector is known to many on this Island, and he carried a veritable Aaron's rod, and everything he smote, books, pamphlets, and maps, perished in abundance. The difficulty which led to the resignation of Mr. Bulmer was the appointment, by the Library Commissioners, during his absence from the Province, of a clerk to prepare a catalogue. It appears that Mr. Bulmer was not consulted about the appointment, and as he could not approve of it he immediately resigned. It is very unfortunate that this difficulty should have arisen, and we are sorry the Library's Commissioners have not found a way to recede from a step which they must have taken without due consideration. In this Province we have seen our Historical Society disbanded simply because there was no one connected with it, officially, who was willing to spend and be spent in library work. No one in fact who was in the highest degree enthusiastic in working out the object of the Society. In Nova Scotia, they had a man who has heart and soul devoted to organizing a library and preserving the records of the Province; but his services are, unfortunately, lost to the public. Channel Tunnel Report.

Unfavorable and Dangerous.

Special Despatch to the Examiner. LONDON, Oct. 13. General Allison's committee which was appointed to report on the advisability of constructing a tunnel between Dover and Calais have sent in a report unfavorable to the project. The report states that the project is a dangerous one, and that the report is supported by a still stronger of objections urged by Sir Garnet Wolseley, and H. R. H. the Duke of Connaught.

A HUNT STOPPED.

Irish National Conference.

Special to the Examiner. DUBLIN, Oct. 13. At Clonmel, Ireland, the farmers and peasantry turned out in large numbers, and stopped a hunt that had met in the neighborhood. The prospectus of the Irish Banking Company has been extensively circulated. The Company is to start with a capital of a million sterling. Justin McCarthy, the famous writer and Member of Parliament, is troubled over the reports that he is endeavoring to break up the Irish Party in Parliament. He emphatically denies any such intention. The Irish National Conference meets next week; a large number of invitations have been issued. Members of the press will be admitted by tickets. It is expected that over fifteen hundred delegates will attend.

Portugal Protests.

SWISS PROHIBITION.

Special to the Examiner. LONDON, Oct. 13. The Portuguese Government protest against the claim of Debrussa and Stanley to the possession of the territory claimed in Congo River, Africa. The Swiss Federal Council have prohibited recruiting, among the Swiss, for the Egyptian service.

GENERAL CABLE NEWS.

LONDON, Oct. 12. Leonard H. Courtney, M. P., joint secretary of the Treasury, opening a Liberal club at Torpoint, denied that the Government arrogated to themselves credit for the victories in Egypt. That country, he said, must eventually become independent of foreign control. The cost of the war should be defrayed by Egypt. No doubt the bondholders would have to forego something. It was not for them that England undertook the war. It would be necessary to consult the powers in regard to a re-settlement, saying the policy of the Government was to detach Egypt from the Sultan, to look after the Suez Canal and to allow the Egyptians to stew in their own juice and in so acting warn the Khedive that his future position depended upon his management of affairs.

THE DAILY NEWS' CAIRO CORRESPONDENT SAYS RIAZ PACHA STILL REFUSES TO ALLOW ENGLISH COUNSEL TO DEFEND ARABI. SIR EDWARD MALET FULLY ADVOCATES THE EMPLOYMENT OF COUNSEL. HE CONTENDS THAT THE DELAY IN GRANTING THE APPLICATION FOR COUNSEL WILL SERIOUSLY PREJUDICE THE CASE OF ARABI, WHO MEANWHILE IS BEING SUBJECTED TO A LONG AND SEVERE SERIES OF PRIVATE EXAMINATIONS.
