A HORRIBLE ACCIDENT.

Fatal Explosion of a Boiler.

LIST OF THE DEAD

St. John, N. B., Nov. 26.

By the explosion of one of the boilers in the old Jewett Mill, at South Bay, this morning three men were instantly killed. Two more died from their injuries shortly after the accident and nearly a dozen were more or less injured, three so badly that they are expected to swell the list of the dead. The boiler house was completely wrecked, one boiler being hurled 300 yards into the Bay, and another 100 feet in the opposite direction. The list of dead is: Michael Lynch, aged 25; Henry Baird, of Passarino—his head was almost completely torn off, the body being found on a deal pile about a hundred feet away from the mill. The dead were buried with their brains and intestines; Andrew Wark, aged 17 years, of Carleton—his head was smashed in and his brains poured out when he was lifted up; James Baird, aged 18; was badly scalded, but his death was caused by internal hemorrhage; Bert Curry was very badly scalded and his face was cut in several places, he was blown on the roof of the mill. The injured are: George Patrick Lynch, face, throat, arms, hands, legs and back scalded so badly that the flesh peeled off; Richard Hayes (colored), his head is crushed almost to a jelly, he will not likely recover; Frank Gait, badly cut on the back of his head, also on the face; John Duggan, one of the firemen, right shoulder dislocated and one of his arms burned; Peter Hanington, left leg fractured below the knee and right arm broken, also internally injured; Ernest Craig, sixteen years old, one of his legs broken, his head scalded, and one of his ears nearly boiled away; Thomas Wark of Carleton had his ribs broken. Geo. Godfrey, Geo. Cusack, John Duke, Adam Armstrong and Timothy Leahy were scalded about the head and arms.

PARNELL'S POSITION.

The Case Plainly Stated by the Liberal Leader.

Nationalists stand by Parnell.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

At the request of Gladstone, Morley has communicated to Parnell a letter written on Monday to Morley by Gladstone, in which he says that notwithstanding the splendid services rendered by Parnell to his country, his continuance at the present moment in leadership would be productive of consequences disastrous in the highest degree to the cause of Ireland, and would place many hearty and effective friends of the Irish cause in a position of great embarrassment and would render his (Gladstone's) intention of the leadership of the Liberal party almost a nullity.

LONDON, Nov. 25.

At a Nationalist meeting held in the committee rooms of the House of Commons every Nationalist member in town was present and the room was crowded. Parnell was cheered as he entered the room. A motion was made and carried unanimously that Parnell be re-elected Chairman of the Irish Parliamentary Party. It is announced that Parnell will retain the leadership at the express wish of his followers.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, Nov. 25.

The Minister of Marine has decided that plans be prepared for a life boat service at Cape Tormentine. Steamship and railway representatives had an interview with the Minister of Agriculture to-day, in reference to joint action in encouraging emigration. If the scheme proposed is carried out the cost of the passage from Liverpool to bona fide settlers will be under eighteen dollars.
